## Librarian uses virtual reference solution to engage students and teachers on sizable campus

Kim Hooper, the Library Media Specialist at John Jay High School in Hopewell Junction, New York, feels like a small fish in a big pond at times. "It's important to use our students' and classroom teachers' time carefully. We must craft students' and classroom teachers' library experiences for maximum impact," Hooper said of the large campus on which she works.

The school, just outside New York City, is home to more than 2,100 students and 200 teachers. While Hooper is able to reach students during study halls and regular library walk-in hours, the sheer size of John Jay High poses logistical challenges with which even a nine-year high school library veteran like Hooper struggles.

The large campus makes it difficult for Hooper to reach each student and acquaint them with the resources available in their own library. Despite the classroom attached to her library, Hooper had noticed students referencing suspect internet sources in their work rather than the trusted sources housed in library materials.

But reaching both students and teachers in such an environment is a challenge that's being overcome thanks to virtual reference materials Hooper can easily make available anywhere and anytime.

### Teacher Usage of *GVRL* Increases Despite Logistical Challenges

Technology has helped Hooper intelligently craft a strategy designed to increase teacher engagement. "I go right for the low hanging fruit." Hooper said, referring to teachers who have already used a virtual reference material product.

It's actually the students and their work at John Jay High who are attracting more teachers to the Gale suite of products. "There's been a 1,200% increase in eBook usage in the last six years," Hooper remarked. "Students are definitely using it quite a bit."

Prior to widespread *GVRL* student adoption, Hooper had become concerned by the internet sources students were citing in their class work.
