## Kids InfoBits Toolbox – How to Write a Topic Sentence

Before you can write a topic sentence, you need to know what a topic sentence is. A topic sentence is a sentence that is all about your main idea. This is as easy as it seems. If your report is about cats, your topic sentence will be about cats. A report about Benjamin Franklin will have a topic sentence about Benjamin Franklin.

To get started, you need to think about what you know about your topic. If you have created a web to organize your ideas, read it. That will help you start thinking about your topic. Your ideas should be about the entire topic, not just one of the smaller circles on the web.

Use the topic of cats as an example. What do you know about cats? List your ideas on a piece of paper.

Any of these ideas could be used to write a topic sentence. Here are some sample topic sentences using the ideas:

- Cats are loved by many people all over the world.
- 2. Cats are amazing animals.
