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COLLECTION OVERVIEW

The Women Missionaries Collection holds essential material for scholars researching the history of both American woman missionaries and the peoples with whom they resided abroad. As an important record of the lives and activities of women encountered in the missionary field, this collection is an excellent—albeit complicated—record of host country cultures at particular times. A highly literate group, women missionaries wrote long letters home and kept journals of their observations of local peoples and customs; several turned their impressions into manuscripts, either fictionalized or biographical.

EDITORIAL NOTE

ORGANIZATION OF MATERIALS ON MICROFILM

Individual collections of papers are grouped into five geographical regions: East Asia, The Pacific Rim, South Asia, Africa, South America, and the United States. Collections within each geographical group are arranged in alphabetical order by country (e.g., China, Japan, and Korea within East Asia). Within each country group, collections are arranged in chronological order, beginning with the earliest document. If a missionary worked in different regions or countries, her collection was placed with the region and country where she spent the most years or that is best illuminated by the contents of her papers.

CONDITION

Some materials in fragile physical condition were not microfilmed. They were removed from consideration to reduce the risk of damage from microfilming.

**Papers of American Women Missionaries from the
Holdings of the Division of Special Collections and University Archives
at the University of Oregon Libraries**

After long decades in which women remained the “invisible men” of missions history, the importance of women to the foreign missionary experience has begun to receive the sustained scholarly attention that it deserves. Recent publications have built on two pioneering works from the 1980s, Jane Hunter’s *Gospel of Gentility*, published in 1984, which dealt with American women missionaries in China, and Patricia Hill’s *The World Their Household*, the first substantial study of the women’s foreign missionary movement within American society, which appeared the following year. Hunter’s book made considerable use of the University of Oregon collection presented here on microfilm, and in so doing alerted other scholars to its scope and importance. Primary Source Microfilm (PSM) and the University of Oregon are to be commended for making the collection more accessible to researchers and students through microfilm, even if future users will thereby be denied the pleasure of a sojourn in Eugene.

The personal papers included in this microfilm collection will make a vital contribution to the ongoing reevaluation of women’s participation in the missionary movement. Collectively they provide an invaluable record of the heyday of mainline American Protestant missions, portrayed through the pens of women—its most numerous participants. The missions were a very important aspect of international contact and communication between the 1880s and the 1950s, and the collection is important for what it shows about how Americans understood the world and their place in it over this period of rapid change. The collection also sheds important light on many dimensions of women’s history in the United States and in the countries in which they served (including the early Oregon Territory as a mission field). These include, among other issues, the changing religious culture of American mainline Protestant churches; prevailing gender norms and the ways women negotiated, challenged, and subverted them; how women experienced and recorded their domestic and personal lives in an alien setting; social conditions in the United States and in countries such as China and India where the women served; and cross-cultural interaction as a human process.

Over the period covered by the collection, from roughly the 1880s until the 1950s, the proportion of women to men in Protestant missions grew exponentially, due primarily to the influx of single women into the missionary ranks, until women outnumbered men by two or three to one. Undergirding their burgeoning numbers were the millions of middle-class church women back home who made up the membership and support base of dozens of denominational women’s missionary societies, financed and run by women. These societies constituted the largest mass woman’s movement in the United States before World War I, and they were an important expression of women’s organizational abilities and growing financial clout.

In the United States as much as in the countries to which missionaries were sent, the women's missionary movement played an important role in altering cultural assumptions about the roles women could play in society. Unlike the missionaries of the early nineteenth century (male or female), among whom college graduates were a rarity, the single women missionaries and their married sisters of this era were generally college-educated, especially those from the eastern United States, where new colleges for women flourished after the Civil War. On the mission field, the primary missionary job description, that of ordained minister/preacher, was of course closed to women. As a result, missionary women (especially single women) typically took on professional roles in the mission field, as educators, physicians, and nurses. This was particularly true of American missions, which were generally better funded than their British and European counterparts and also more optimistic about the religious efficacy of education and other forms of social uplift.

The women represented in this collection include single and married women from all three of the above-mentioned professions, as well as some who took less typical roles. Often missionary women found themselves able to function more independently and exercise leadership more frequently on the mission field than they would have been able to do at home. Certainly the "demonstration effect" of these missionary women was significant for their students and associates in the countries in which they worked. It was also important for the development of women's professional cultures back at home, as accounts of the lives and deeds of missionary women circulated in print and in person. Missionary periodicals, pamphlets, and books, along with encounters with actual missionaries on furlough, were an important means through which knowledge of foreign lands circulated in American society – another potential area of study to which this collection contributes.

Ida Belle (or Idabelle) Lewis Main (1887-1969) is a perfect example. The daughter of the Methodist bishop Wilson S. Lewis (bishop in China from around 1900 to 1921), she went to China in 1910 and had a long and varied career in education, including an important stint as president of the Hwa Nan Women's College in Fuzhou (Foochow) during its transition from American to Chinese control (1925-1928). Like a good number of the missionary educators of her generation, Ida Belle Lewis studied at the Teacher's College of Columbia University in New York, and published a number of books and reports over her career, particularly concerning the education of girls in China. She married a fellow missionary, William Main, later in life, and continued her professional career in China and, after 1950, in Brazil. Lewis was an intelligent and eloquent observer of Chinese society, and the substantial collection of her papers reproduced here includes letters, diaries, and photographs. Her account of the 1925-1928 transition at Hwa Nan sheds important light on the pressures on the college during a period in which the Christian missions and their schools and colleges were under severe political attack in China.

Ida Belle Lewis Main and others like her served as important examples and mentors to women in China and the other countries in which they served. The women's schools and colleges that these missionary women founded and in which they served were important in opening up new avenues into professional careers for many Chinese women. Lewis Main herself was a valued mentor to many of them, including Lucy Wang (Wang Shijing), who succeeded her as president of Hwa Nan from 1928 until 1951 (some letters from Wang are also in the collection). Similar cases of missionary women educators as life examples can be found in this collection for other countries as well, including Japan, Korea, and the Congo.

As far as new professional careers go, few can have been more out of the ordinary than that of Eleanor Wilson (1891-1972), whose papers also form part of the collection. After a missionary career with the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions (ABCFM) in Japan and its Pacific dominions, as well as a stint in Hawaii during World War II, she joined the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), was ordained in that denomination, and in 1950 became the skipper of a mission ship, the *Morning Star VI*, that itinerated through the Pacific. Wilson remained in that role until her retirement in 1961, at the age of seventy.

Most of the educational missionaries, particularly those teaching in higher-level institutions like colleges, spent the bulk of their careers in major cities, as did a good percentage of the doctors and nurses. There are exceptions, however, such as the missionary nurse Mae Boucher, who worked in the inland town of Yen-p'ing (now Nanping) in the rugged interior of Fujian Province in south China. The timing of Boucher's arrival was unfortunate, for after less than a year she was forced to flee to the Philippines along with the other inland Fujian missionaries when anti-Christian violence erupted in January 1926 in the wake of the Northern Expedition, which brought China under the control of the Guomindang (Kuomintang or Nationalist) Party. Boucher returned to Yen-p'ing in June 1927 and remained there until 1931, after which she returned to the United States to take care of her ailing mother.

As will be evident from this guide, the great majority of the women in this collection (twenty-one out of thirty-four) spent their missionary lives in China, in the twilight years of the last of the imperial dynasties, the Qing (1644-1911), and through the turbulent decades of China's Republican period (1912-1949), which ended with the victory of the Chinese Communist Party in 1949. This span of seventy years was a tumultuous one for the world's most populous country, and missionaries were both observers of and participants in the upheavals that wracked China during this period. In particular, the microhistory of the upheavals in the wake of the Northern Expedition are described in several of the sets of papers, including those of Ida Belle Lewis Main and Mae Boucher. The same can be said for the experience of the missionaries during World War II, both before Pearl Harbor, when American missionaries often used their neutral status creatively to help their Chinese associates, and after it, when many missionaries were interned by the Japanese forces. Several of the collections also give personal insights into China's civil war and Communist revolution of the late 1940s.

It is important that this collection focuses on women's papers, for many of them were exceptionally perceptive and empathetic commentators on events and persons in the societies in which they lived. Indeed, one of the research questions that can be asked is whether one can detect a gendered difference between the voice adopted in this collection and others that are more generally male, such as the archival collections of the missions themselves (some of which are also on microfilm from Thomson Gale.¹ Certainly it is true that collections of personal papers like this one are more revealing, more idiosyncratic, and generally more interesting (although less systematic) than the archives of the missions, which include a good deal of purely administrative content.

Political upheavals notwithstanding, China remained a sovereign nation, while much of the rest of the world fell under the sway of the colonial empires of the Western nations and Japan over the period covered by this collection. Aside from those in China, most of the women whose papers are included in this collection lived under one or another of the colonial powers—in Korea under Japanese rule, in British India before and after independence, and in the Belgian Congo. Their papers offer an American woman's perspective on these different colonialisms. Others worked in South America (Brazil and Paraguay) and in the Pacific. China was not alone in experiencing dramatic social conflict during this period, and the papers from India include commentary on the violence following the partition of India and Pakistan that accompanied the British withdrawal in 1947. In both cases, the accounts found in these papers are invaluable for putting a human face on large historical events that are too readily viewed in abstract terms. These accounts are also accessible to students at the postsecondary level, and the collection will be invaluable for college instructors in many disciplines—history, anthropology, women's studies, religious studies, cultural studies, to name a few—who want their students to learn to carry out research using primary sources.

Direct colonization was not the only approach taken by imperialists in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, and missionaries have often been accused of "cultural imperialism" toward the societies in which they worked. The term cultural imperialism may be too vague to be helpful, but it is certainly true that missionaries wanted to change things in the societies in which they worked, on many levels: religious, educational, medical, political. It is also true that their efforts contributed, often with far too little reflection, to the globalization of modes of social organization that we now think of as "modern." Trying to understand the ways in which missionaries were implicated in cultural imperialism on their microlevel, or whether modernity itself is a form of imperialism, is one of the issues with which this collection will help researchers at all levels grapple. Just as the geographical selection within the collection is skewed toward China, the religious spectrum covered is a partial one only. Most of the women represented belonged to the missions of the more energetic Protestant denominations in the American West, since the papers that made their way to the University of Oregon are from people with family ties to the western United States. The most heavily represented are the Methodists, who were an important presence in California and Oregon. Presbyterians and

a smattering of Baptists and Congregationalists make up the remainder, along with one woman who was not a missionary at all but the wife of a career officer in the Chinese Maritime Customs Service, Helen Merrill Groff-Smith (b. 1892). Also included are the papers of Eliza Anne Hughes Davis, a California resident who was the daughter and wife of Methodist ministers and the sister of missionaries, whose letters she collected assiduously.

As with any collection of historical materials, therefore, the researcher must bear in mind that this one does not cover the entire gamut of American women's religious experience. There are no voices here from the evangelical, Pentecostal, or fundamentalist strands, which exerted a growing influence on American Protestant Christianity and on the mission field over the period. Roman Catholic women are likewise absent.

Nevertheless, what the collection does offer is a fascinating cross-section of the American missionary experience through the eyes of women who participated in it. One of the remarkable things about missionary archives in general and this collection in particular is that they give historians and researchers insight into the personal lives of people who were, at base, "regular folks." These are not the great statesmen or captains of industry whose papers are found in presidential libraries and archives of governments or corporations. Of course, in some ways missionaries were extraordinary or at least atypical people – and certainly many of them lived extraordinary lives. But from another perspective they were often ordinary people in exceptional circumstances, and it is difficult to think of another set of documents that contains such a concentration and diversity of voices of relatively undistinguished people as those found in personal missionary papers like those made available here.

Also of great importance is the wealth of ephemeral and miscellaneous material often preserved in missionary papers, and probably nowhere else. The reader will find in this collection school catalogues from schools long closed and all but forgotten; funeral notices, wedding invitations, calling cards, and petitions; obscure pamphlets and yellow newspaper clippings; letters from unknown people, sometimes in near-forgotten dialects; diaries and memoirs composed with frankness, obfuscation, and spin in varying proportions; and of course photographs, by the boxful.

The research potential in a collection such as this is vast, and the challenge it poses to scholars and students is how to think broadly enough to tap the treasures it contains. The relevance to historians is clear enough, be they historians of the United States, of women, of China and the other countries in which the missionaries worked, or of cross-cultural encounters in the imperialist era. Anthropologists will also find fruitful material here. Other researchers may find the collection of interest as much for its form as its content, since it opens up questions about letters, diaries, and autobiographies as literary genres and as forms of self-production through writing.

The publishers and the library made the sensible decision to focus this microfilm collection around the theme of women's experience, and consequently omitted many of the other sets of missionary papers to be found at the University of Oregon. These include, for example, those of the Methodist doctors James Skinner and Susan Lawrence Skinner (1871-1952), who worked for decades in the rugged interior of Fujian Province in south China. Their letters and memoirs are packed with fascinating detail on life in the Chinese hinterland in the 1920s and 1930s. In addition to his medical work, James Skinner operated as a jack-of-all-trades when it came to engineering projects, and included in the collection is a detailed account of a trip he took in the early 1920s to investigate the feasibility of installing an electricity generator on a river in inland Fujian, and the resulting negotiations with the local notables. It provides a fascinating glimpse into the very first stages of what would become one of the basic building blocks of Chinese industrialization, hydroelectric power.

For these papers and others, researchers will still need to travel to Eugene, as they will also be able to look through the rich photographic record included in the personal papers. However, they will do so better prepared and better informed thanks to the work of PSM in making this collection available on microfilm. It deserves to see wide and extensive use.

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The Emily Hatfield Hobart Papers, 1884-1943

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Emily Hatfield Hobart's legacy is one of self-sacrifice, and her papers are remarkable for the perspective they offer on the domestic affairs of missionary life in China.. Born August 14, 1860, Emily Hatfield spent her young life in Evanston, Illinois, was educated at Northwestern University. She married Reverend William M. Hatfield in 1881, then joined him on a Methodist mission to China. Arriving there in 1882, the Hobarts first lived in Peking for several years (with annual summer vacations in the western highlands to avoid the seasonal epidemics of smallpox and scarlet fever sweeping the crowded city), as Rev. Hobart acclimated to the demands of missionary work. Mrs. Hobart meanwhile studied Mandarin in order to better teach groups of native women the Christian doctrine, a task which she undertook with considerable disdain. A dedicated daughter to her adoring parents, and a loving sister to her three siblings, Mrs. Hobart similarly committed herself to beginning and keeping a large family. She was pregnant for most of her young life, losing several children to prenatal and early childhood complications while also raising to maturity two daughters, Elizabeth ("Bessie") and Louisa ("Louie"), and two sons, Robert ("Bob") and Marcus.

Since western elementary education was unavailable, Mrs. Hobart took responsibility for her childrens' schooling, which added considerably to the demands of her daily life. Once Rev. Hobart received charge of a mission, the family moved west to Tsun Hua in 1893, although civil troubles began there shortly afterward in 1895. Although she made clear her devotion to raising her family in China, Mrs. Hobart grew increasingly lonely for her relations in the U.S. following another miscarriage in 1896. Her uneasiness was compounded by two months' convalescence from a nearly fatal illness during the summer of 1898, and when Mrs. Hobart recovered she ended seventeen continuous years in China as she and her children went to live with her mother in Florida.

After her children were grown, however, Mrs. Hobart traveled back to her husband in Peking in 1909, returning alone to the U.S. in 1913. In 1927 Mrs. Hobart rejoined her husband for work in the large Shantung mission, just as major civil strife began with Chiang Kai-shek's three-year terror campaign against hundreds of thousands of communists in Chinese cities. Although she was encouraged to leave Shantung for safety in Tsinan on April 28, 1928, Mrs. Hobart felt she would be deserting her duty, and she remained along with her husband within the mission compound for protection. However, on the following day Mrs. Hobart was fatally shot through a window of her home by nationalist troops firing over the compound's walls. Rev. Hobart succeeded her in death shortly after his return to the U.S. in April 1932.

In memory of her sacrifice, Northwestern University erected an all-women's dormitory in 1928, which was named Hobart House in honor of Mrs. Emily Hatfield Hobart as an alumna. Today, this building houses the university's Women's Residential College.

*The Eliza Anne Hughes Davis Papers, 1895-1920***BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Eliza Anne Hughes devoted her young life to her immediate family and her work in the Methodist Church, which are decisions that founded her lifetime commitment to both institutions. The daughter of Reverend George (who also worked as a publisher of Christian texts) and Mrs. Abby T. Hughes of Newark, New Jersey, Eliza Hughes married Reverend Mayhew W. Davis in 1896, then moved with him from Bradley Beach, New Jersey, to Pasadena, California. The couple had a total of five children, but their youngest child died soon after his birth, and the other children apparently endured significant health problems in their early years. Although Mrs. Davis also suffered repeatedly for most of her adult life from illnesses that eluded clear diagnosis and treatments, she worked steadily as a homemaker and enjoyed a brief stint in the winter of 1915-16 as a writer for the Home Page of the *Pasadena Daily News*. Following her father's death in 1900, Mrs. Abby T. Hughes joined her daughter and son-in-law in Pasadena, which she felt was the best compromise for proximity to her children in both the U.S. and abroad.

Mrs. Davis' siblings also followed their father in the work of the church. Mamie, her oldest sister, married a Methodist missionary to India, although she died young under unknown circumstances, while her next-youngest sister Anne worked with a church relief organization in New York City. Mrs. Davis' brother George joined the Methodist Episcopal ministry and established his own church in Corydon, Iowa, while her youngest sister, Jennie V. Hughes, enlisted in 1906 with the Women's Foreign Missionary Service in China, serving for a number of years as Principal of the Knowles Bible Training School, Kiukiang, in affiliation with the Danforth Memorial Hospital.

The Idabelle Main Papers, 1895-1978

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Idabelle Lewis Main was born December 15, 1887 at Blairstown, Iowa to Wilson Seely Lewis and Fanny McClung. She graduated from Morningside College in 1909 and was assigned by the Women’s Society of Christian Services of the Methodist Church to teach at the Keene school in Tientsin, China. She returned in 1916 to Columbia Teachers College, New York.

She returned to Shanghai, China in 1919 to work for the Women’s Society of Christian Service. In 1921 she was appointed president of the Hwanan College, Foochow, China. She held this position until 1926 when she returned to the Women’s Society to serve as editor of the Mission paper.

In 1932 she married Reverend William A. Main and lived in China until 1941 when the Japanese invasion forced them to return to the United States where they bought a home in Mill Valley, California. In 1942 Dr. Main served as a minister of the Tamalpais Valley Community Church. After her husband’s death in 1945 she returned to Foochow, China where she taught until 1949. She returned to Mill Valley and in 1950 accepted a position at Bennetts College in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, a position she held until 1955. She lived in her family home until 1961 and then moved to the Robincroft Home for retired missionary women, where she lived until her death in 1969.

*The Laura Maude Wheeler Papers, 1903-1966***BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Laura Maude Wheeler was born in Manitowoc, Wisconsin in 1874. Her father was a minister and had been a Methodist missionary to China. He took her and the rest of the family to China during his missionary service when Laura was six years old. She returned to the United States for high school and college, graduating from Lawrence College in Appleton, Wisconsin. She taught for a few years before becoming a Methodist missionary in China in 1903. During her first term she was located in Peking at the Gamewell School. During her next term and throughout the rest of her missionary career, which ended in 1948, Wheeler worked in Tientsin in Northern China at the Keen School, first as a teacher and later as an administrator. She is a writer and a traveler, a collector of photos and pictures, and a person acutely aware of China's foreign, cultural and physical landscape. From 1943 to 1945, Wheeler was held in an internment camp, with around two thousand other foreigners, during the Japanese military campaign in China. After her retirement in 1948, she resided in Pasadena, California and continued to be an active evangelist, evident in her writings and correspondence from this time period. She died in July of 1966.

*The Myra Anna Jaquet Papers, 1913-1944***BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Myra Anna Jaquet was as a Methodist missionary in northern China from 1911 to 1942. She worked as a girls' instructor at a missionary school in Peking (Beijing). By the early 1920s, Jaquet had moved southeast to Tientsin (Tianjin) where she served as one of the instructors (and, for a short time, as principal of girls' education) at the Gamewell School. In December 1941, the Japanese confined Jaquet as a prisoner of war. After six weeks imprisonment, she joined other missionaries who were interned at the British concession near Peking (Beijing). Along with other Americans, Jaquet was repatriated in 1943. Jaquet lived in New York until 1946 when she returned to Tianjin.

*The Margaret Moninger Papers, 1915-1939***BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Mary Margaret Moninger was born near Marshalltown, Iowa on September 23rd, 1892 to two farmers, William Ringland Moninger and Mary Helen Kellogg. Moninger graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Grinnell College in 1913. She received her M. A. from Grinnell in 1922. She was a teacher for two years in New Providence, Iowa until leaving for Hainan, China in 1915 as a member of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions. Her regular duties as a missionary were teaching and acting as a principal at several girls' schools throughout the island of Hainan. She served as secretary, treasurer and agent of her missionary organization.

Moninger was a prolific writer with a keen eye for the unique culture of Hainan. She compiled an immense, unpublished dictionary of the Hainese colloquial dialect. She also penned a mission publication, *The Isle of Palms: Sketches of Hainan*, in 1919. Moninger wrote several casual articles for religious publications, and newspapers in the United States. She also wrote anthropological essays for the benefit of scientific organizations. She edited her community's publication, *The Hainan Newsletter*. According to her biographer, Kathleen Lodwick, Moninger also was interested in botany and her Hainese specimens can today be found at Harvard, Iowa State University, and the national arboretum of the Philippines.

During her stay in China, Moninger experienced periods of civil unrest. She witnessed the military actions of the Nationalist party in the 1920's, communist and anti-Christian uprisings during the 1930's, and old struggles between Hainese tribes. In 1937, the Japanese invaded Hainan, a part of the Second Sino-Japanese War. Moninger saw the affected Chinese and later encountered the war first hand and faced house arrest during the Japanese occupation. Her missionary service was cut short by the United States entrance into World War II. She returned to Iowa to live with her father and sister in 1942 and taught for two years until she had a stroke. She died March 21, 1950 in Marshalltown.

*The Monona Cheney Papers, 1918-1932***BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Monona L Cheney was born in Madison, Wisconsin on December 28, 1890. She was educated at Lawrence College in Appleton, Wisconsin, receiving a B.A. in 1914; she went on to receive an M.A. in education at Teachers' College, Columbia University in 1918. In 1918 she traveled to the newly formed Republic of China to spread the word of her church, serving as a missionary teacher for the Methodist Episcopal sect of the Christian religion. She initially taught at the Keen School in Tientsin until 1920, when she started teaching at the Gamewell School. She taught history, English, and bible studies, and engaged in rural evangelicalism in the Peking area. After a short break in the United States she returned to China and taught at Yenching University from 1926 until 1930. The letters she wrote during her mission were addressed to her family, and she also was fond of taking photographs of Chinese life.

*The Elizabeth Curtis Wright Papers, 1919-1973***BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Born in Connecticut in 1887, Elizabeth Curtis Wright began missionary work in 1919 and was assigned to the Y.W.C.A. in Tientsin in northern China. Wright joined the Presbyterian Foreign Mission in 1926 and moved to Nanhshou, Anhui Province, where she taught at a mission school. Wright also taught in Pyengyang (Korea) during the late 1920s after the Presbytery removed missionaries from Anhui Province due civil war in China. Wright remained in Nanhshou until 1931 when she was reassigned to a mission school in Beijing. In 1941, the Japanese interned her as a prisoner of war in Weihsien, Shantung Province.² Wright was repatriated in 1943; she returned to Beijing in 1946 along with hundreds of other missionaries and resumed her teaching duties at the missionary school. Communist successes precipitated her evacuation to the U.S. late in 1948. Wright spent the remaining three years of her missionary service in the Tennessee mountains at Sunset Gap Mission. She retired from missionary work in the early 1950s. She published her memoirs in 1973 and died in Tennessee in 1974.

*The Irene Forsythe Hanson Papers, 1921-1980***BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Hazel Atwood was born circa 1891. She became a Congregational missionary nurse in 1921, serving for the American Board of Commissioners of Foreign Missions. She was a nurse at the Foochow Christian Union Hospital, later the Willis F. Pierce Memorial Hospital, in Foochow, Fukien Province, China. She later became the director of the school of nursing in Foochow. Atwood served until the 1940's. She was on furlough in the United States during anti-Christian uprisings of January 1927 and again circa 1934. She was present for Japan's attacks on Foochow and subsequent invasion, which began in 1938. Her last furlough detailed in this collection, circa 1949, was extended due to the communist threat in China and a general down-turn in missionary activity. A proposed appointment to a hospital in Rhodesia fell through and she retired from the service of the ABCFM in 1950.

The Irene Forsythe Hanson Papers, 1921-1980

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Irene Forsythe Hanson's twenty-five year career as a Presbyterian missionary to China ended abruptly in 1951, when emissaries of the Chinese Communist government roused her at 3:30am and gave her two hours to prepare for deportation to the United States. She had been harangued by the news media and in public meetings for eight weeks prior to this event; the Chinese government accused her of being a "chief American spy." Thus warned, she had prepared a bag filled with warm clothing in case of deportation to Siberia, and a lighter bag of "essentials" should she be imprisoned.

Hanson was born in 1898 in Enterprise, Oregon. She received a B.S. degree from Muskingum College (Ohio) in 1919, and also graduated from the Moody Bible Institute (Chicago) in 1924. It was not long after she arrived in Tsingtao (Qingdao), China in 1926, that the Nanking Incident exploded. Strife between Nationalists and Communists escalated to the point that foreign missionaries were not safe. Hanson and her fellow missionaries left China for Korea, where she continued her Chinese language studies.

Soon, Hanson was back in China. Her language studies completed, she began a unique program of missionary work. With two Chinese Christians, Hanson became a village evangelist and teacher bringing Christianity to people in the countryside, most of whom had never seen a foreigner. She traveled by wheelbarrow and many of her experiences are found in her book, *The Wheelbarrow and the Comrade* (1972).

While traveling in China's countryside Hanson met an old Chinese Christian woman who adopted her, thus making her part of an extended Chinese family. This experience produced a book titled *Cheng's Mother* (1943).

The 1930s were a decade of turmoil; Japanese troops were invading China attempting to expand their territory. After Japan attacked Pearl Harbor, Hanson was placed under house arrest for six months before being sent out of China in an exchange for prisoners in 1942.

Hanson spent the war years in the United States doing promotional work for Chinese missions. In 1946 she returned to China and was deported five years later by Chinese Communists.

Back home in 1952 she married Perry O. Hanson, who had been a missionary in China. Her missionary life over, Hanson returned to school for post-graduate work. She wrote and lectured about her experiences in China. She died in 1976.

The Esther Morse Papers, 1921 – 1965

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Born in Dustin, Nebraska, 1898, Esther Malinda Morse was a physician and spent a lifetime serving the Presbyterian Church as a missionary doctor in China, India, and Pakistan. Morse attended Hastings College and the University of Nebraska College of Medicine. She obtained her medical degree in 1930 and entered the Presbyterian Missionary Society. She arrived in Kachek on Hainan Island (off the southern coast of China) in the fall of 1930. She learned Cantonese and spent much of the next twelve years on the island. Morse had specialized in obstetrics in medical school. Consequently, most of her patients were women and young children—in particular, expectant mothers and their newborns. Morse’s papers indicate that the majority of her work was medical rather than evangelical.

In December 1940, the Japanese Army placed Morse, along with other American missionaries in Hainan, under arrest as prisoners of war. In her letters, Morse recounts this experience as well as her exchange and repatriation in 1942.³ Morse did not stay long in the United States. By 1944, after touring the U.S. raising support for overseas missionaries, Morse again set out to return to China. She suffered health problems and spent much of 1944 convalescing in Miraj hospital in Calcutta, India. The Presbytery assigned her to stay in India until January of 1946 when she returned to China. Initially, she worked in Canton (Guangzhou) before finally returning to Hoihow (Haikou) on Hainan Island.

After spending almost three years confined to her hospital by the communist government, Morse left China in 1953 and obtained a new assignment that sent her to Lahore in western Pakistan. She remained there until 1963 when she retired from missionary work and returned to the United States. She lived in Washington State until her death in 1975.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Lyrel G. Teagarden was born in Danbury, Connecticut on April 23, 1894. She graduated from Danbury High School in 1912 and received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Bethany College in 1916. She obtained her Master of Arts degree in 1920 from the College of Missions; her master's thesis was entitled *The Place of Women in Chinese Civilization*. She was given an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Bethany College in 1951. Her furlough study time was spent at Union Theological Seminary and Cornell University, among others.

As a member of the Disciples of Christ Church, Teagarden served as a missionary in China, from 1920 to 1951; in Jamaica, from 1952 to 1956; and worked for two years in the Yakima Indian Mission in Washington State during World War II, when she could not return to China. Her area of service was religious education, leadership training, and evangelistic and educational work. She has had short stories, articles, and poems published in *World Call*, *The Christian Evangelist*, *The Northeastern Christian*, and *The Messenger*. She has also published six volumes in Chinese for teachers of religious education in China.

*The Mae Baucher Papers, 1926-1931***BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Mae Baucher was a Methodist Episcopal missionary in Yenping, China. She arrived in Yenping on March 19th, 1926. She was a registered nurse, headed the nursing department for Yenping's hospital and taught nursing practices to Chinese students. Early in her missionary service, January 20th, 1927, Baucher was forced to flee Yenping for the Philippines. All missionaries in the area became the targets of Chinese antagonism. She stayed in Manila and then relocated to a hospital in Baguio where she worked until her return to China in June of 1927. When Baucher returned home on furlough in 1931, she ended up staying in order to be with her ailing mother, ending Baucher's missionary career.

Along with other American (and British) missionaries, Snow was interned by the Japanese in 1941 as a prisoner of war. She was repatriated to the U.S. in 1943, and the collection offers no clues about her life after World War II.

The Edith Winifred Simester Letters from China, 1930-1952

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Born into a Methodist missionary family in China, Edith Simester attended Chinese schools before moving to the United States where she attended college and graduate school. In 1930, Simester entered missionary service and moved to Foochow (Fuzhou) in northern China where she worked as a teacher in a missionary school. She remained in Fuzhou until 1946 (however, it appears that she was in the United States during much of World War II, from 1937-45) when she returned to the U.S. to care for her ailing mother. Simester took a missionary post in Brazil, in order to be closer to her mother who died in 1952.

The Clara Pearl Dyer Letters from Ch'angli, China, 1935-1941

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Clara Dyer served as a Methodist missionary in Ch'angli, Hopei [Hopeh] Province, in northern China, during much of the first half of the twentieth century. Dyer appears to have begun missionary work in China in 1908; by 1931 she taught girls at the Alderman School in Ch'angli. As an experienced missionary, Dyer sent letters updating her friends and family approximately every six months. Dyer remained in China even after the all-out war between China and Japan began in 1937. The collection does not contain information on Dyer after 1941.

Ruth A. Gress obtained her B.A. at Fletcher College in Iowa, and completed her M.A. at the University of Michigan. Gress spent a term at the Garrett Biblical Institute in Illinois and a spring semester at Berkeley Baptist Divinity School in California. Gress was part of the Women's Division of Christian Services and traveled to China in 1939 where she was stationed in Nanping and Fukien. She worked as an English teacher in a co-educational high school, and taught English classes in a nursing school of the Methodist Hospital. Gress was the director of youth work in the Nanping Methodist Church and she gave private organ and piano lessons to students in the high school and the nurses' training school. Gress recorded her missionary experiences in a brief diary. After Gress returned to America, she corresponded with fellow missionary Ethel Wallace and was actively involved in national conferences concerning issues related to the Chinese population in America and Christianity among the Chinese population.

The Barbara M. Kelman Hayes Biography of John Hayes

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Born into a Presbyterian minister's family in 1893 in Aberdeen, Scotland, Barbara Kelman married missionary John Hayes in 1916. They settled in Peking (Beijing) and where they worked as missionaries. The Hayeses lived in Peking until 1941 when Barbara moved with their five children to Baguio in the Philippines. In 1943, the Japanese resettled them, along with other foreigners, to Manila and placed them under house arrest. John, who had remained in Beijing, was interned in Weih sien in Shantung Province. Barbara and the children were repatriated in 1943; John remained imprisoned until the end of the war. After the war, Barbara worked for the Minister of the National Presbyterian Church in Washington, D.C., while John resumed missionary work in China. She joined him in Kueichow in 1948 but was evacuated to Hong Kong the following year. John Hayes was arrested by the communist-led government in 1951 and expelled from China in 1952. The Hayeses enjoyed the limelight that anti-communism caste on John as a missionary expelled from "Red China." In 1955, the Presbyterian Church reassigned John to Indonesia (where he died in 1957) and Barbara began a prolonged speaking tour in the U.S. Following her husband's death, Hayes collected and organized John's papers and donated them to the Presbyterian Historical Society in Philadelphia, to the Chinese Records Project at the Library of Yale Divinity, and to the University of Oregon Special Collections on foreign missionaries.

The Eleanor Wilson Papers, 1925-1951

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Eleanor Wilson was born in Norwalk, Connecticut, and educated at Simmons College and the New York Biblical Seminary (Columbia). In 1925 she went to Japan as a missionary teacher for the Congregational Church, and was stationed at the Kobe Theological Seminary for Women. From 1933-1935 she worked in the office of the American Board of Foreign Missions, Boston. In 1935 she went to the Mission Training School in Kusaie, Caroline Islands, as teacher, later principal, remaining until 1941. During World War II she was in the United States, lecturing for the mission board. In 1945 she went to Hawaii, where she was ordained a Christian Church minister, and in 1946 resumed missionary work in the Pacific area, particularly in the Marshall and Caroline Islands.

In 1950 Wilson became the captain of the *Morning Star VI*, one of a sequence of mission ships in the Pacific. She retired in 1961. Wilson's career is the subject of a book by Maribelle Cormack, *The Lady Was a Skipper* (N.Y., 1956), and in the Maribelle Cormack Papers (Ax 418) at the University of Oregon are notes about, and letters from, Eleanor Wilson.

Eleanor Wilson died in 1969 in a Claremont, California retirement center. She was 80 years old.

The Mathilde R. Moses Letters from India, 1916–1949

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Born in Stonewall, Texas, and educated at Denver University, Mathilde R. Moses became a Methodist missionary to India in 1916. Moses worked as a missionary teacher, under the auspices of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society, Methodist Episcopal Church. From 1917 to 1919 she was a teacher at Girls' High School in Cawnpore. Soon after Moses reluctantly became principal of the Hudson Memorial School and remained there from 1920 to 1921. In 1922, she returned to the United States via the Near East and Europe. She returned to India in 1923, teaching at the Sawtelle Girls' School, Arrah, Bihar. In the 1930s she was with the Adams Girls' School, Almora, U.P., and with the Methodist girls schools in Roorkee and Bareilly. During her missionary work in India, Moses also traveled widely.

The Suzanne E. Weddell Papers, 1916-1978

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Suzanne “Sue” Emma Weddell (1884-1978) dedicated her life to the missionary educational movement abroad and to the enhancement of the rights of women. The daughter of a Baptist clergyman, Weddell was born in Chicago and graduated from Bucknell University in Lewisburg, Pennsylvania. From 1919 to 1926, she served as secretary of the Younger Girls Department of the Young Men’s Christian Association in New York, and later was a general secretary of the Woman’s Board of Foreign Missions of the Reformed Church of America.

In 1938, Weddell was selected to be one of the 10 women delegates from North America to attend a conference of the International Missionary Council of India, which brought together Christian leaders of 69 countries in Madras. This trip had a profound impact on Weddell, who was not only inspired by such a great and multinational gathering of missionaries, but also fascinated by India.

In 1945, Weddell plunged with zest into the atmosphere of international cooperation that swirled around the San Francisco Conference, at which the United Nations charter was drawn. Weddell went to San Francisco to represent the National Council of Churches as a consultant to the United States delegation.

Weddell wrote several books on education and religion while performing her executive duties with the Reformed Church; she also traveled extensively around the world to lecture and teach.

Sue Weddell died quietly in her sleep at Ocean Grove, New Jersey in 1978. She was 94 years old.

The Elizabeth G. Lewis Dunbar Autobiography, 1947

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Elizabeth G. Lewis Dunbar was born around 1887 and raised in central California's San Joaquin Valley. She attended the University of California and Mills College, and attained her medical degree in the early 1910s. After her mother's death, she entered missionary work with the Presbyterian Church. Explaining that she sought community esteem among individuals in need of medical care, she decided to go to China. The Presbyterian Missionary Society placed her in India and she began her work there—in Ludhiana in the Punjab—in 1916. She performed most of her medical missionary work in Ambala. In 1931, she married George Dunbar (approximately 15 years her senior) who was a Scottish educational missionary she met in India. They both retired from missionary work in the late 1930s. They continued to reside in India and Elizabeth pursued a private medical practice in Dehra Dun. George died around 1941 or '42 and Elizabeth moved from the Punjab—as part of the British evacuation of all missionaries— around 1949 with the outbreak of war between Indian and Pakistan. Materials attached to autobiography indicate that she died in 1960.

The Eleanore Holliday Llewellyn Papers, Undated

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Eleanore Holliday Llewellyn (November 10, 1893-) was born in 1893, in Gurdaspur, Punjab, India. She was born to Missionary parents and attended high school in Wooster and Cadiz, Ohio. She later graduated from Western College for Women in Oxford, Ohio in 1914. She subsequently taught in Cedarville, Ohio, and in Monessen, Pennsylvania.

In 1918, Eleanore Holliday attended Biblical Seminary in New York, where she met her future husband, Frank Bowman Llewellyn. They were both assigned as missionaries for the Presbyterian Church in India. In 1919, after finishing a year of Punjabi language school, the Llewellyns were married in Landour, India.

From 1919 to 1921, Rev. Frank Llewellyn was head of a high school in Lahore (now Pakistan). Eleanore Llewellyn was head of the school for Hindu girls, also in Lahore. In 1921, they were transferred to district evangelical work in the villages of the Punjab. Rev. Llewellyn was preaching and teaching as well as organizing the building projects. He was instrumental in the baptism and conversion of thousands of the lower caste or “untouchables.” Eleanore Llewellyn contributed much to the teaching and welfare of the people.

A daughter, Dorothy Ann, was born in 1923. She was educated in the United States, and received her medical degree from Washington University in St. Louis. She married a physician, Elrie Rodgers.

Eleanore Llewellyn did graduate work in education and anthropology during furloughs, and was asked to speak on both subjects often. During World War II she was a volunteer supervisor of a civilian organization of Punjabi women. They looked after the welfare of families whose men were involved in the war. She was given a “Kaisar-I-Hind” medal of honor for her service.

Frank and Eleanore Llewellyn retired from Missionary service in 1956, after which they served in churches in California.

Eleanore Llewellyn wrote a Christian novel entitled *My Tears in Thy Bottle*. It is a story about a member of the “untouchable” caste converting to Christianity and his relationship to a member of the Sikh community in 1947, during the creation of the Republic of Pakistan.

Llewellyn retired to Westminster Gardens, a retirement community for missionaries from all over the world, in Duarte, California.

Letha Evangeline Ward Wakeman was born in 1898 in Alton, Illinois. She was the daughter of Thomas and Effie Ward, missionaries to Lagos. Wakeman was educated at Ouachita Baptist University, Arkadelphia, Arkansas. She married Andrew Vergil Wakeman, Baptist missionary to the Congo, where they lived from 1922-1926. They returned to the United States when Andrew contracted filariasis. His condition worsened and he spent much of his later life institutionalized. Letha Wakeman became active in the Oregon Migrant Ministry, especially the Migratory Mission, known as Eola Village, in Yamhill County. She became director of the Gleaners Chapel and was named Oregon Mother of the Year in 1973. Wakeman died in 1974.

The Gladys Oberlin Papers, 1943-1980

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Born in 1908, Gladys Oberlin grew up on Silver Spring, Maryland. In 1943, Oberlin traveled to Brazil as a Methodist Missionary where she taught home economics at Bennett College in Rio de Janeiro. Seeing more challenges in her work, Oberlin decided to leave Bennett College in 1948. She moved to the Rural Institute in Itapina, Espirito Santo, Brazil. There, she experimented with the available vegetation in an effort to increase the nutritional value of local foods. She continued with this work until her missionary furlough in 1954.

Following a year-long furlough in the United States, Oberlin accepted a new position as the director of the Instituto Ana Gonzago, an orphanage in Rio de Janeiro. As director of 175 children, Oberlin taught religious classes. She remained there until 1959 when she began teaching at the Instituto Central de Povo.

In 1960, Oberlin became involved in field work in Rio Grande do Sul. She returned to nutritional experiments and was instrumental in establishing a nutritional program at the Redife community center that provided multi-purpose food (MPF) in the form of a high-protein dietary supplement to the region's poor and undernourished. As educational counselor, she developed and implemented educational nutrition and hygiene projects. She and her assistants compiled several pamphlets and presentations, including a filmstrip, on nutrition. She remained in Recife and the surrounding area until her retirement in 1976. Within a year, however, she was called back to the Recife suburbs because of a need for nutritional and hygiene programs there. She remained there until her final retirement in 1981 when she returned to the United States.

The Hazel Chamberlain Papers, 1922-1925

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Hazel Chamberlain served as a missionary in Paraguay in the early 1920s. A native of New Jersey, Chamberlain immigrated to Villarrica, Paraguay, in May 1922. Chamberlain served as an educator and evangelist in this town and the surrounding countryside for the next two years. Paraguay grappled with internal violence and revolution during Chamberlain’s first year of residency and she discusses how this impacted her, her missionary work, and the lives of locals. At some point during the 1920s, Chamberlain married fellow missionary W. J. Anderson, a Canadian, and she may have moved to Toronto. Little else is known about Chamberlain since the collection consists of only three years of letters.

The Almira Adeline David Raymond Letters from Oregon, 1840-1880

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Born circa 1820, Almira Adeline Raymond was a globe-trotting missionary in 1840. She sailed from Valparaiso, Chile, and to the Sandwich Islands (Hawaii) before arriving in Oregon's Willamette Valley. She and her husband were part of a mission during their first few years in Oregon, but by 1852 had moved away and operated their own farm. Raymond was the only American woman in the Valley during the first few years. Her husband served as the delivery nurse for most of her nine childbirths. Raymond remained in the Willamette Valley through 1880 and perhaps through the end of her life.
