Introduction

The Cleveland Workhouse was formally established as a separate institution in January 1871. The Workhouse had previously shared quarters with the City Infirmary in the Brooklyn district of Cleveland. The new location was originally intended as a place where petty law-breakers could work at productive occupations, specifically chair and brush making, to help pay their fines and court costs. In July 1871 the House of Refuge and Correction was established as part of the Workhouse to give the same opportunities to law-breakers under the age of sixteen. A school, under the direction of the chaplain, was established with the House of Refuge for both juvenile and adult prisoners.

After a farm colony was built in Warrensville in 1905, under the auspices of Harris R. Cooley, head of the Cleveland Department of Charities and Correction, the Workhouse and House of Refuge gradually moved their operations to that site, until they were completely established there in 1907. The Workhouse became part of the Warrensville complex known as the Cooley Farms. The Farms consisted of the Correction Farm, Overlook Farm (a tuberculosis sanatorium), Highland Park Farm (500 acres of land intended for use as a city cemetery), and the Boys' Farm.

At this time the Cleveland Workhouse became one of the leading progressive penal institutions in the country. The guiding principle of the Workhouse-rehabilitation through productive occupation-changed somewhat during this period. The adult male prisoners were removed from chair and brush making to outdoor occupations such as building roads, digging ditches, crushing stone, and growing farm produce. The women and juvenile prisoners continued to make chairs and brushes. The Workhouse

maintained its position as a progressive penal institution through the mayoralties of Tom L. Johnson and Newton D. Baker.

Although the Workhouse has diminished in prominence, it still exists as a prison in Warrensville under the name of the Warrensville House of Correction of the City of Cleveland.

Scope and Content

The Cleveland Workhouse and House of Refuge and Correction Records, 1855-1950 consist of correspondence, minutes of the Workhouse Board of Directors, registers, time books, daily records, payroll books, invoices, financial statements, cash books inventories, balance books, and medical records. Though principally related to the administration and functions of the Workhouse, certain records relate to allied organizations, including the City Infirmary and the Department of Outdoor Relief.

The records, arranged in six series, are maintained partially on microfilm and partially in original form. All materials in Series I through III are available only on this micropublication. The original records were deaccessioned in 1983 because of their deteriorated condition. Other series are available in original form only.

Series I, Minutes of the Workhouse Board of Directors, contains the records of applications by prisoners and their families for pardon or parole. The minutes are arranged chronologically.

Series II, Inmate Records, consists of registers of paupers, prisoners, visitors, deaths, patients at the City Infirmary, time books for male and female prisoners, daily records and reports, and medical records. The records, arranged by type and then chronologically, contain a variety of information such as the name of a prisoner, his or her date of admission, nationality, offense, and sentence.

Series III, Operational Records, consists of financial statements, balance books, employees time and payroll books, invoices, and inventories. The series is arranged by record type and then chronologically.

The Cleveland Workhouse and House of Refuge and Correction Records provide valuable insight into the internal and external workings of a prison in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The registers and case file cards contain valuable statistical and genealogical information such as name, age, sex, work assignment, religion, and occasionally address, names and addresses of relatives, date and reason for committal and release, race, and national origin. The financial records and the time books of the prisoners provide details on the Workhouse chair and brush records of the Outdoor Relief Those businesses. Department (Series III) provide information on the function of a governmental relief agency in the early years of the twentieth century. These files also relate to the Outdoor Relief Department's relations with private charitable organizations such as the Associated Charities of Cleveland.
