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INTRODUCTION

This microfilm publication contains typed transcripts of most of the surviving pre-Civil War wills of 21 South Carolina counties. The counties whose records appear here are Abbeville, Anderson, Barnwell, Chester, Darlington, Edgefield, Fairfield, Greenville, Horry, Kershaw, Laurens, Marion, Marlboro, Newberry, Pickens, Richland, Spartanburg, Sumter, Union, Williamsburg, and York. No pre-Civil War probate records have survived for Beaufort, Chesterfield, Colleton, Georgetown, Lancaster, Lexington, and Orangeburg Counties. Also omitted from this publication, although for different reasons, are the will transcripts for Charleston County, the only other county for which such records exist. The Charleston County transcripts are indexed separately and contain wills for the entire state in the colonial period; they constitute, at least for research purposes, a separate series. The Charleston transcripts were filmed for the Genealogical Society of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints in 1952 and are already available through that filming project.

Often casually though erroneously referred to as "WPA Typed Copies," the records reproduced in this microcopy were actually a product of the Works Progress Administration's predecessor, the Civil Works Administration (CWA). The CWA program that produced these volumes began several years before the more widely known WPA Statewide Historical Project and Historical Records Survey. Projects such as these developed in the 1930s as the federal government, seeking to combat the problems of unemployment and survival, shifted their emphasis from simple relief to the work-relief concept. On November 20, 1933, a conference on emergency needs for women was held at the White House. Attended by women who were nationally prominent in government and social work and by representatives from social and cultural organizations, among whom was the President-General of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), they discussed and devised projects that could provide work for the unemployed white-collar female. A subsequent conference was called

by Malcolm J. Miller, South Carolina State Supervisor, to meet ten days later at the Governor's Mansion in Columbia. Participants included Mrs. St. Julian M. Barnwell, the State Director of Women's Work, and Mrs. Thomas Joab Mauldin, the South Carolina State Regent of the DAR. As a result of these conferences, the South Carolina DAR agreed to sponsor a project whose ambitious initial goals were to copy "all the valuable records in our several counties both for their preservation and to give employment to many." The project subsequently limited its transcription to the wills of the 22 counties in existence in 1853 whose probate records had survived. The statewide copying of wills began under the supervision of Mrs. Jessie Reid Burnett, DAR State Historian, in conjunction with the CWA.

The economic stringencies that produced this project also deprive us of some information about it. The DAR reported in 1934 that, like many other organizations, it found itself "in an embarrassing financial condition" and was forced, therefore, to omit from its Yearbook the reports of the state officers. Conditions apparently improved, and subsequent reports were printed. By the annual meeting in March 1935, Mrs. Burnett could report that "the twenty-two counties eligible to the project of reclaiming the records of the Probate Courts through 1853 are complete with the exception of Charleston, Edgefield, and Abbeville. . . . so far, the file of this work at the University of South Carolina numbers sixty-one volumes of old Wills, the earliest dating back to 1671." Mrs. Burnett did not attend the annual meeting in 1936, but her final report was read by the State Regent at the Historical Session on March 4:

My personal attention has, this year, been given to the concluding work of the reclaiming of the Wills of the Court of Ordinary (Probate Court) of South Carolina records through 1853. Abbeville, the last county to do the work, will bind her last volume by the end of March. This will place the 99th volume of this work on the shelves of the University Library, and means that the State of South Carolina has a complete file, bound in 99 volumes of the reclaimed wills of the records of the Court of Ordinary (Probate Court) in the 22 counties of the state, antedating 1853.

Before the Abbeville volumes were finished the WPA was providing the funding, and the work was being supervised by Flora Bell Surles of the successor copying project, the Statewide Historical Project. Nonetheless, although they did not finish the work themselves, the DAR did have the satisfaction of seeing the will project complete. The will transcripts, which were first made available

to researchers at the University of South Carolina, were transferred to the Archives Department in 1951 where they continued to receive constant use.

Probate records provide much information for several aspects of historical research. A will is defined as "the legal expression or declaration of a person's mind or wishes as to the disposition of his property, to be performed or take effect after his death."8 Handwritten by the testator or for him by his attorney, but in any event bearing his signature or mark, the will was presented for probate at the appropriate courthouse after the testator's death. In the probate office a clerk entered a copy of the document into books kept for that purpose, after which the original will was itself filed in an "estate packet" with other documents relating to the settlement of the particular estate. The loose will was the original document while the clerk's copy became the copy of record. "An Act Concerning the Office and Duties of Ordinary" passed in December 1839 required keeping separate books for wills; for inventories, appraisements, and sales; for returns; and for other types of probate documents, but prior to that date the various types of documents were generally recorded in miscellaneous "Estate Records Books." In a few counties after the enactment of the 1839 court reforms, pre-1840 wills were extracted from the miscellaneous books and transcribed into separate "Will Books;" in those cases where the CWA transcribers worked from these compiled books, the transcripts therefore became fourth generation copies of original wills.

Although twice or three times removed from the original wills, the transcripts in this series are not without importance. As a consolidated set, these volumes, in conjunction with the Charleston will transcripts, have long provided the most expeditious route to the contents of antebellum South Carolina wills. The volumes were rendered widely accessible by a published county-by-county index; 10 in addition a much more easily used unpublished consolidated index to testators has been available for use in the Search Room of the South Carolina Archives and is reproduced here for the first time. The value of the set goes beyond mere convenience, however; in some cases these

transcripts may well reproduce information no longer extant in damaged originals. Although we have not made the detailed collation that would be necessary to establish this as fact, we do know this to be the case with the companion Charleston transcripts.

Subjected to many years of very heavy use, the deteriorating transcripts in this series have been a source of concern for some time. A microfilm publication seemed the best method of preserving this useful research tool, but a number of the volumes in the department's set were so damaged that pages and parts of pages were already missing. Fortunately, when the transcripts were made one copy of each volume had been deposited in its respective county. County libraries and probate offices have generously lent their copies when they were needed for producing this microcopy; the department's Local Records Section assisted with picking up and returning the volumes. Although many of the locally held copies were themselves in poor condition, we were able, between those volumes and the department's set, to fill all the gaps and assemble on this microfilm publication a complete run of the transcripts.¹¹

A few words of caution are in order. This project had a two-fold purpose—to provide employment and to copy records—with priorities in that order. Many unemployed typists, and good ones too, were put to work, but few were experienced in reading and transcribing old manuscripts. There are, of course, the usual transposed letters and misspellings. But sometimes the errors carry more weight. The biographer of Christopher Gadsden, for instance, should be warned against reading too much into Gadsden's bequest to the grandchildren of his "last worthy friend, George Gabriel Powell, Esquire, deceased." Reference to the manuscript volume reveals the more prosaic description, "late worthy friend."12 The careful researcher will want to go beyond these transcripts to examine the originals. Fortunately almost all the manuscript volumes from which these transcripts were made are available on microfilm sold either by this department or by the Genealogical Society of Utah. many cases the estate packets have also been filmed. The only counties where the manuscript volumes are not thus fully available are Barnwell, Horry, Sumter, and Kershaw. In the case of the unfilmed Sumter volumes (M. D-1, and D-2) the originals have been transferred to the South Carolina Archives.

It should be pointed out that all sales copies of this microcopy, like all the department's microfilm, are third generation positives created from a second generation reproduction negative. Given the nature of the sometimes fuzzy carbon copies reproduced here, fourth generation paper copies made from this film may not always be clearly legible. Because the first generation master negative must be retained unused for security purposes, it is not possible to sell second generation duplicates. One second generation positive has been made so that the department can supply clear paper copies upon request.

FINDING AIDS AND RELATED RECORDS

Dating and pagination of the volumes reproduced here are unsystematic. Some of the volumes are described by dates that refer to the years in which the wills were probated or recorded; others are described by the years in which the wills were first drawn up. The method of pagination in transcript volumes that contain more than one will book also varies. In some of these volumes the pages are numbered in one continuous sequence; in others each will book has its own discrete pagination.

The finding aid to this microcopy, set out in Appendix A, helps to clarify these ambiguities. The dates given in Appendix A are the dates the CWA transcribers assigned to each of the volumes; in those cases where they indicate the dates when the wills were written, dates of probate have been added in brackets to assist the researcher. The method of dealing with the problem of unsystematic pagination is best illustrated by an example of how Appendix A may be used to find a particular will. Roll 1 reproduces the consolidated alphabetical index to testators. The transcripts follow on subsequent rolls in alphabetical order by county. A researcher interested in Elizabeth Abbott should first look at roll 1 and there find that Elizabeth Abbott's will is in Anderson County Wills, Volume 2, Will Book B, page 334. Volume 2 of Anderson County, reproduced on roll 4, is shown in Appendix A as containing several will books, the beginning of each indicated by a counter number, which has been placed in the upper right-hand corner of the frame to which it refers. Will Book B begins at counter number 540. From this counter number the researcher should be able to quickly reach page number 334 and the will of Elizabeth Abbott. If the researcher wishes to go beyond the microfilmed copy of the transcript of Elizabeth Abbott's will to examine the record copy from which the transcript was made, Appendix B provides a convenient listing of microfilm of these manuscript volumes. As already noted, some of the volumes for Barnwell, Horry, Sumter, and Kershaw Counties are not available on microfilm. It should also be pointed out that the estate packets for Abbeville, Anderson, Barnwell, Chester, Edgefield, Fairfield, Laurens, Marlboro, Pickens, Richland, Sumter, Union, and York Counties are available on microfilm either from this department or from the Genealogical Society of Utah. Further information about microfilm of local records available for sale from this department can be obtained from our Publications Division.

The transcripts presented here do not mark the end of Depression era copying of South Carolina recorded wills. The WPA's Statewide Historical Project took up will transcription where the CWA project left off, in some cases carrying the effort forward to include wills probated in the 20th century. ¹³ Typed in

a different format from the CWA transcripts and frequently not provided with even volume indexes, these transcripts were also deposited at the University of South Carolina. Transferred to the department with the rest of the Statewide Historical Project copies of public records in 1967, these transcripts have been much less heavily used and remain in good condition. The will book transcripts from this later copying project are listed in Appendix C.
