Scope and Content

This collection consists of records of the Woman's Peace Party that were collected by the Swarthmore College Peace Collection in the 1930s. Part of these records came from Chicago with Jane Addams's personal papers in 1930; part came from the U.S. Section office (Washington, DC) of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom; part were discovered in the basement of Hull House, Chicago, in 1939. In addition, some records were transferred in 1938 from the Labadie Collection at the University of Michigan with the agreement of Agnes Inglis (curator of the Labadie Collection), Ellen Starr Brinton (curator of the Peace Collection), and Dr. James P. Warbasse, who had given the material to the Labadie Collection. Apparently, Crystal Eastman had left these records with Warbasse for safekeeping during World War I. They consist of correspondence of the New York Branch of the Woman's Peace Party.

Additional records were given to the Peace Collection by individuals who had been active in the Woman's Peace Party, including Emily Greene Balch, Rose Dabney Forbes, Lucia Ames Mead, and Alice Thacher Post.

The collected records of the Woman's Peace Party include minutes, speeches, correspondence, and other materials relating to the Organization Conference held in January 1915; Executive Board minutes (1915-1919); correspondence (1914-1919); membership lists, statements, resolutions, reports, releases (form letters), literature, and clippings. Some material relating to the International Congress of Women at The Hague, April 1915, and to the American delegation of the International Committee of Women for Permanent Peace (1915-1919) also will be found in this collection.

The collection includes material from various state branches of the Woman's Peace Party. Records from two of the more active branches, New York and Massachusetts, include scattered minutes, correspondence, resolutions, releases, and literature.

Among the correspondents are Jane Addams, Emily Greene Balch, Carrie Chapman Catt, Katherine D. Cumberson, Crystal Eastman, Rose Dabney Forbes, Zona Gale, Hannah Clothier Hull, Eleanor Daggett Karsten, Margaret Lane, Louis P. Lochner, Lucia Ames Mead, Alice Thacher Post, Rosika Schwimmer, May Wright Sewall, Rebecca Shelley, Anna Garlin Spencer, Harriet P. Thomas, Julia Grace Wales, Agnes D. Warbasse, and Ruth C. Williams.

In addition to the records of the Woman's Peace Party which are available on microfilm, the Peace Collection has eight scrapbooks (primarily newspaper clippings) assembled by the Massachusetts Branch (later called the League for Permanent Peace). These scrapbooks are available for use by researchers in the Peace Collection.

History

On January 10, 1915, approximately 3,000 women met at the New Willard Hotel in Washington, DC, to address the situation created by the outbreak of World War I. Jane Addams of Hull House and Carrie Chapman Catt, a leader of the international suffrage movement, called the conference in response to the efforts of Rosika Schwimmer, a Hungarian suffragist, journalist, and social worker, and Emmeline Pethick-Lawrence, an English feminist, to convince women of the United States to join their European counterparts in protesting the war. There were about eighty-six official delegates at the conference, of whom most were suffragists. They represented such diverse groups as peace, suffrage, temperance, educational and social workers' organizations, the National Women's Trade Union League, the National Council of Women, and the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The platform committee, composed of Catt, Addams, Fannie Fern Andrews, Charlotte Perkins Gilman, Lucia Ames Mead, Alice Thacher Post, and Anna Garlin Spencer, drew up an eleven-point platform that the conference approved. This platform called for a conference of neutrals to offer continuous mediation as a way to end the war (the Wisconsin plan), supported woman suffrage, and established the Woman's Peace Party (WPP).

The WPP was headquartered in Chicago, with Addams as chairman, Mead as national secretary, Harriet P. Thomas as executive secretary, Sophonisba P. Breckinridge as treasurer, and Elizabeth Glendower Evans as national organizer. They contacted prominent women associated with the peace movement in each state, urging them to start branches. The WPP joined with other peace groups to form the National Peace Federation, which petitioned the Wilson administration to call a conference of neutral nations for continuous mediation. Part of the WPP's campaign to sway public opinion was their production of Euripides' The Trojan Women, which was presented in many cities across the country.

At the end of February 1915 the WPP received an invitation to attend an international conference of women pacifists at The Hague. The primary sponsor of the International Congress of Women was the International Woman Suffrage Alliance, headed by Catt. Addams chaired the congress; she and Andrews were the two members from the United States on the executive committee. Most of the forty-seven U.S. delegates were WPP members, but others represented groups such as the Immigrants' Protective League, the Universal Peace Union, and the Woman's Trade Union League. Some of the U.S. delegates went as individuals.

The International Congress of Women opened on April 28, 1915, with delegates from twelve countries, including the Netherlands, the United States, Germany, Great Britain, Canada, Hungary, Austria, and Norway. The program adopted by the congress was much like the WPP's platform. The Hague congress appealed for mediation to end the war and in general called for repudiation of war, support for arbitration and conciliation in settling disputes, democratic control of foreign policy, woman suffrage, popular consent prior to territorial transfers between nations, general disarmament, freedom of the seas and free trade, and voiding of secret treaties. Before closing, the congress established the International Committee of Women for Permanent Peace (ICWPP), with representatives from each country and plans to hold a second international congress at the same time as a peace conference to end the war. The congress also delegated two groups of envoys to visit

the governments of belligerent and neutral nations of Europe and the president of the United States in support of a conference for continuous mediation. These delegations, whose U.S. members were Jane Addams, Alice Hamilton, Emily Greene Balch, and Julia Grace Wales, talked with the governments of fourteen European countries in about five weeks. After returning to the United States, Addams, Balch, and other peace leaders met with President Wilson and his aides on a number of occasions to try to convince them to initiate a conference of neutrals. Through the fall of 1915, the WPP attempted to marshal public opinion in support of such action.

When it seemed unlikely that Wilson would call a conference, members of the WPP, as individuals, turned to automobile magnate Henry Ford, who offered private financing for a conference. Addams and others considered his idea of chartering a ship to carry the delegates to Europe a costly public relations gimmick, but they appreciated his support for the neutral conference. Despite problems associated with the Ford Peace Expedition, the Neutral Conference for Continuous Mediation did meet in Stockholm and remained in session during 1916 and early 1917, with delegates from Denmark, the Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United States. They publicized various peace proposals, investigated problems hindering a constructive peace, and kept alive the idea of mediation. Balch served as the U.S. delegate as a replacement for Addams, who had fallen seriously ill.

In addition to its efforts for a neutral conference, the WPP opposed steps taken by the U.S. government to prepare for war. Especially active in the antipreparedness campaign was the New York Branch, which had been started by Crystal Eastman prior to the founding of the national WPP. The WPP also protested U.S. imperialism in Haiti, Nicaragua, the Virgin Islands, and the Dominican Republic. In early 1917, as the United States moved closer to war, the WPP joined other peace societies in calling for a popular referendum before declaring war. With U.S. entry, the WPP remained pacifist but stressed internationalism and support for a League of Nations, instead of protesting the war. Addams lectured for the Department of Food Administration, and members of the Massachusetts Branch of the WPP were particularly active in food conservation. The WPP wholeheartedly supported Wilson's Fourteen Points.

The congress that the Hague congress had agreed to hold concurrently with the peace conference met in Zurich in May 1919. In six days of sessions the delegates passed resolutions for an end to the blockade of Germany, more democratic organization of the League of Nations, total disarmament, and universal free trade, and against many of the terms of the Versailles peace treaty. The ICWPP then formed itself into a permanent organization, the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF), to be composed of national sections and headquartered in Geneva. Jane Addams was elected president, and Emily Greene Balch became secretary-treasurer. In November 1919 the WPP accepted the resolutions of the Zurich congress and agreed to become the United States Section of the WILPF.

Arrangement

The records of the Woman's Peace Party (10 3/4 ft.) are arranged in two series: Series A, Historical Records, and Series B, Correspondence. Series A might also have been called Administrative Records. It consists of a variety of materials from the national organization and from some of the state branches, particularly New York and Massachusetts. Boxes 1 - 3 contain records of the national organization, with the first box consisting of materials relating to the Organization Conference in January 1915 and to Annual Meetings held from 1916 to 1919. Boxes 2 and 3 contain minutes of the Executive Board and other materials, arranged first by type of material and then by date. Boxes 4 - 8 contain records of the various state branches, again arranged by type of material and then by date. Box 9 contains material relating to the Woman's Peace Party found in the Swarthmore College Peace Collection after Series A had been microfilmed in 1980. These items came from the papers of Emily Greene Balch and from several other sources.

Presumably, the arrangement of Series A was established by the staff of the Peace Collection when these records originally were sorted in the late 1930s and early 1940s. Because the records came from a variety of sources, it is unlikely that the order in which materials are now filed has anything to do with the order in which they were filed in the offices of the Woman's Peace Party. When Series A was microfilmed in 1980, the basic arrangement of the collection was maintained and the order of items within folders was not changed. Researchers should be aware of the fact that some items are out of order chronologically and that the divisions among various types of material are not always clear.

Series B, Correspondence is divided into two subseries. Series B,1 (Boxes 1 - 13) is correspondence of the National Office of the Woman's Peace Party, Chicago, Illinois. Series B,2 (Boxes 14 - 18) is correspondence of the New York Branch (primarily New York City) of the Woman's Peace Party. Both subseries cover the period 1915-1919, although there are a few scattered letters dating from late 1914 filed in Series B,1.

Both Series B,1 and B,2 are arranged first alphabetically and then by date. The chronological arrangement is quite rough. In most instances, carbons of letters sent out by the WPP office are filed in front of the letters to which they reply. In letter-of-the-alphabet (miscellaneous) folders containing more than one year of correspondence, there is usually a separate alphabetical sequence for each year. Researchers looking for correspondence to or from a particular individual or organization should be particularly careful when looking through these miscellaneous folders. Also, researchers should be aware of the fact that there are errors in filing, both in alphabetical sequence within letter-of-the-alphabet folders and in chronology. Occasional errors in span dates given on folder labels have been found. If there is a difference between dates given in the Checklist and those typed on folder labels, it is because an error has been found and corrected dates have been given in the Checklist.
