

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PUBLISHER'S NOTE

Harvester Microform already have available an unparalleled microfiche library of British Political Pamphlets. This new collection adds depth and range to the material already reproduced and is a landmark in Labour publishing. As part of the famous Independent Labour Party Archives, the pamphlets included are those received, acquired, and purchased since the formation of the Independent Labour Party in 1893 though many pamphlets predate this and the series begins in 1884.

The ILP became the largest and most influential of British socialist organisations and its history is in large part the story of the early growth of working-class parliamentary power. The pamphlets here illustrate what influenced the ILP, what was read, the personal connections of the main protagonists, the organisation exchanges with groups and parties, the full range of the social, cultural and political concerns and how they were often inextricably combined.

Every attempt has been made to avoid duplication of material available elsewhere in our pamphlet and leaflet collection and certain groups and parties have been omitted. Thus we have not included material from the British Labour Party, the TUC, the Fabian Society (apart from some rare local branch material), the Social Democratic Federation, and the War Resisters' International.

Part One of the Series covers the years 1884-1897 and appears on Cards 1-121. The years 1898 to 1902 make up Part Two on Cards 122-231. The years 1903-1907 make up Part Three on Cards 232-359, and 1908-1911 make up Part Four on Cards 360-481. Part Five appears on Cards 482-613 and covers the years from 1912-1918. The fiche numbering of all parts within this series is continuous.

It is only possible to hint at the richness of this collection but the range of pressure groups and radical presses in Part Five includes:- Peace Society, The National Land & Home League, Fair Trade Workers' Union, The London Municipal Society, Insurance Tax Protest League, Workers' Anti-Militarist Committee, The New Age, The Christian Commonwealth Co., Clarion, National Committee for the Prevention of Destitution, Society of Friends, The Anti-Socialist Union of the Churches, League of Peace & Freedom, No-Conscription Fellowship - and a great many others. Though the coverage of any one group is not definitive, the collection as a whole makes easily accessible a corpus of material which offers new insights into the concerns of the day and will be welcomed by all social and labour historians.

The series will be published in parts in chronological order. A complete listing will appear at the beginning of each part with the relevant section of the listing being reproduced again at the beginning of each year. An author index appears on the first fiche of each part.

Many of the pamphlets and leaflets are undated. After discussing the problem with librarians and scholars Harvester Microform has given a date of publication to all items - with a varying degree of certainty and accuracy. Where the date of publication, within two or three years, has been

inferred from reliable internal or external evidence, it appears thus: 1912?. If there is no evidence for a more accurate date than within five or ten years, it appears thus: c1912?

All documents on the listing have been numbered with a code indicating the year of issue and the number of each document within the year of issue. Thus 1912/7 means that this is the seventh document in the 1912 listing. The material has been filmed in the order of the listing. The contents of each fiche are clearly shown on the fiche headers, and in this particular case the document's reference on the header reads 1912: 1912/6(cont.) - 1912/9. Document 1912/7 appears on this fiche and can be easily traced.

A group/organisation cumulative index will be prepared as the programme proceeds but this will not be issued until nearer the completion of the series. A cumulative author index will also be issued. Usually London is the place of publication when none is given and, when there is no significance in the publishing body, only the town of publication is given. When complete this will be a microfiche library of the greatest significance offering a new body of research and insights into a great mass of little known or unknown socialist presses and pressure groups.

A Note on the Material.

Attention should be drawn to the nature of some of the original material. This was sometimes produced with an eye to economy and printed on poor paper; and a number of the covers have been printed black on dark red. These original characteristics occasionally present difficulties of image and contrast which stringent tests and camera alterations cannot entirely overcome. "Best Copy Available" targets have been inserted where applicable and every effort has been made to minimise these difficulties. We have sought to exercise responsible care in the production of this unique pamphet collection and to meet the standards established by the National Microform Association (NMA) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI).
