

PUBLISHER'S NOTE

Research Publications (incorporating Harvester Microform) already have available an unparalleled

microfiche library of British Political Pamphlets. This collection adds depth and range to the material already reproduced and is a landmark in Labour publishing. As part of the famous independent Labour Party Archives, the pamphlets included in Part 8 are those received, acquired, and purchased between 1934 and 1945.

The ILP became the largest and most influential of British socialist organisations and its history is in large part the story of the early growth of working-class parliamentary power. The material 1934-1945 illustrates the views and attitudes of the ILP over this period. It shows what was read, highlights the personal connections of the leading protagonists, and covers a wide range of social, cultural and political concerns. There are contributions from leading personalities from all sides of the political arena, but the majority are from the left. Included, for instance are some notable pamphlets compiled by F.W. Jowett, H.N. Brailsford, G.D.H. Cole, Rosa Luxemburg, Harry Pollitt, Sir William Beveridge, Oswald Mosley, R.H. Tawney, Lord Lothian, Sir Robert Vansittart, P.J. Noel-Baker, and translations of essays by Trotsky and Stalin. There is important material on the attitudes and the response to fascism, the use of armed force, the problems of Jewish refugees, rearmament, the Nazi threat, Stalin, Trotsky, the failures of the League of Nations, the Spanish Civil War, the Munich Crisis and the Second World War. Many pamphlets also cover economic issues, education, social welfare, pacifism, and the condition of the working class.

Every attempt has been made to avoid duplication of material available elsewhere in our pamphlet and leaflet collection and certain groups and parties have been omitted. Thus we have not generally included material from the British Labour Party, the TUC, the Fabian Society (apart from some rare local branch material), the Social Democratic Federation, and the War Resisters' International.

Part One of the series covers the years 1884-1897; Part Two the years 1898-1902; Part Three the years 1903-1907; Part Four the years 1908-1911; Part Five the years 1912-1918; Part Six the years 1919-1925; Part Seven the years 1926-1933. The fiche numbering of all parts within this series is continuous.

It is only possible to hint at the richness of this collection but the range of pressure groups and radical presses in Part Eight includes The Socialist League, The Communist Party of Great Britain, The Friends Peace Committee, The Co-operative Party, The Printing and Allied Trades Anti-Fascist Movement - and a great many others. Though the coverage of any one group is not definitive, the collection as a whole makes easily accessible a corpus of material which offers new insights into the concerns of the day and will be welcomed by all social and labour historians.

The series is published in parts in chronological order. A complete listing appears at the beginning of each part with the relevant section of the listing being reproduced again at the

beginning of each year. An author index appears on the first fiche of each part.

Many of the pamphlets and leaflets are undated. After discussing the problem with librarians and scholars Research Publications has given a date of publication to all items - with a varying degree of certainty and accuracy. Where the date of publication, within two or three years, has been inferred from reliable internal or external evidence, it appears thus: 1936? If there is no evidence for a more accurate date than within five or ten years, it appears thus: c1936?

All documents on the listing have been numbered with a code indicating the year of issue and the number of each document within the year of issue. Thus 1935/2 means that this is the second document in the 1935 listing. The material has been filmed in the order of the listing. The contents of each fiche are clearly shown on the fiche headers, and in this particular case the document's reference on the header for card 901 reads 1935; 1935/1 - 1935/2 (cont. on card 902). Document 1935/2 appears on fiche 901, 902 and 903 and can be easily traced.

A group/organisation cumulative index will be prepared as the programme proceeds, but this will not be issued until nearer the completion of the series. A cumulative author index will also be issued. Usually London is the place of publication when none is given and, when there is no significance in the publishing body, only the town of publication is given. When complete this will be a microfiche library of the greatest significance offering a new body of research and insights into a great mass of little known or unknown socialist presses and pressure groups.
