TECHNICAL NOTE

The Harvester Press has set itself the highest standards in the field of archivally-permanent library microfilming. Our microform publications have been prepared and produced in accordance with recommended and established guide-lines for the production of microform of superior quality. These conform to the recommendations of the standard guides to good microforming and micropublishing practice.

Attention should be drawn to the nature of the original material. Sixteenth and seventeenth century documents within the British Library sometimes consist of faintly legible correspondence and records written with a variety of inks and pens and on paper which has become severely discolored or stained, or which is so thin that there is show-through that renders the original document difficult to read. Occasionally volumes have been tightly bound and documents are obscured in the inner margin. These original characteristics present difficulties of image and contrast which stringent tests and camera alterations cannot entirely overcome. Every effort has been made to minimise these difficulties though there are some few pages or documents which have proved impossible to reproduce satisfactorily. Conscious of this we have chosen to include these pages in order to make available the complete volume. The British Library has exercised the most responsible care in the filming of this unique collection and this microfilm publication meets the standards established by the National Microform Association (NMA) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI).
