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PUBLISHER'S NOTE

Research Publications are pleased to present Part One of the Primary Social Sources (PSS) microfiche series Self-Help Groups and Health Information. This Basic Set brings together significant material covering the period January-June 1988 as well as a number of earlier pamphlets whose information is still relevant. The majority of the information is current. This is attributable to the fact that public health literature is most useful when it is up-to-date and of immediate relevance to the user. The small number of retrospective items which are featured have been selected by the issuing bodies as containing information which is still applicable.

The material takes a number of different formats: public information leaflets, self-help booklets, journals and posters. These are provided by 21 issuing bodies from various sections of the self-help field.

This is an on-going series which will appear annually. The first update will feature the publications issued from Summer 1988 to Summer 1989, and we hope in the future to include a wider range of organisations.

A Bibliographical Guide to Self-Help Groups and Health Information accompanies the Research Publications/PSS microfiche collection. The material has been arranged on an easily-used and fully-indexed system. The groups are listed in alphabetical sequence and the individual items appear in chronological order within each group. The very first item of each group is labelled '1' and these reference numbers are clearly marked in the top right-hand corner on the front of each item. For easy access the guide incorporates a number of finding aids - a chronological index showing the reference number, author, title, date of publication and the number(s) of the fiche on which the item appears; a thematic index which subdivides the groups into medical areas and an author index. There is also a list of participating organisations giving brief biographical details.

On a number of items the date of publications is unclear and since it is not possible to date them accurately by the content, they have been listed as 'undated' and appear at the end of the chronological sequence.

This collection seeks to close a major gap in library coverage of public/patient health information. It is the first self-help reference scheme available on microfiche in this country and will be of interest to anyone wishing to provide or gain access to health care information.

Research Publications are grateful for the support of those groups whose publications are featured in the collection. Special thanks go to Mr. Robert Gann, Health Information Manager at the Help for Health Information Centre, Southampton General Hospital whose expert advice, assistance and enthusiasm have been invaluable in securing the launch of this series.

INTRODUCTION

The past ten years have seen an unprecedented explosion in the number and range of self-help groups in the UK. There are now self-help groups for almost every condition, through the alphabet from asthma and allergies to thalassaemia and tuberous sclerosis. Before the Second World War almost the only organisations for people with specific illnesses and handicaps were those for the blind and the deaf. Then a wide range of organisations was established by and for parents of handicapped children (e.g. the Spastics Society and MENCAP). In turn the 1960s and 1970s saw a boom in self-help organisations run by disabled people themselves. Further groups have been established by women joining together to overcome common problems as part of the women's health movement.

Self-help groups have many valuable functions - providing contact and mutual support for those who might otherwise be isolated and unable to cope, providing practical services such as transport schemes and holidays, and often providing the only source of information on many illnesses and disabilities.

Today many patients are seeking more information on their health and want to become more active partners in their own care. For their part doctors are increasingly ready to provide more information but it is clear that information given verbally in the consultation is all too easily forgotten. A number of research studies have shown the value of self-help leaflets in improving patients' understanding of illness, recall of the doctor's advice and cooperation with treatment. Some general practices are now building up collections of this literature to support communication in the consultation.

A further development during the 1970s and 1980s has been the interest in 'community information' in public libraries, and within health care libraries a growing involvement in 'patient information'. Both of these activities have led to a demand for cheaply priced, accessible material giving basic advice to help people to manage their own lives, including of course their own health. As in general practice, self-help groups as well as national bodies like the Health Education Authority have been identified as the major providers of health information.

The self-help field presents for librarians and other information gatherers many of the problems of 'grey literature'. It is characterised by a preponderance of small publishers whose publications do not appear in the major national bibliographies, causing problems in identification of useful material. Acquisition of material is labour intensive, usually involving an individual letter with postal order. Finally, effective storage is a problem. Leaflets and information sheets do not shelve neatly and are liable to mutilation and loss.

The Help for Health Information Service at Southampton General Hospital has been involved in the acquisition and provision of self-help literature to health staff and patients for a number of years and has experienced the value (and the frustration) of this material at first hand. The advantages of having the material available in microform are obvious, overcoming the disadvantages of acquisition and storage, and enabling librarians and others to review items in microform before deciding whether to acquire copies. We welcome Research Publications initiative and are pleased to act as advisers to the project.
