

PUBLISHER'S NOTE

Forming Series Three of our major programme devoted to Pacifism, Disarmament and International Relations, Harvester Microform are proud to announce the publication of the Archives of the Peace Pledge Union. Part 1 of this Series makes available the Annual Reports, 1937-1985, and the Minute Books, 1936-1972. It also includes a number of early circulars and documents as well as some local material, including Minute Books, from the London area, Streatham, Richmond, Edmonton and Nottingham groups. Part 2 includes the PPU Journal, The Pacifist, pamphlets, leaflets, and other publications, 1936-1986.

The Peace Pledge Union is a voluntary association of complete pacifists. It was once Britain's largest and most influential peace group and still is the most significant pacifist organisation in Britain.

The PPU grew from a widely-published letter to the press, appearing in the Manchester Guardian, Daily Herald, News Chronicle and a number of weekly and provincial newspapers on 16 October 1934. In this letter the Reverend Dick Sheppard, former Vicar of St. Martins-in-the-Fields and Dean of Canterbury, appealed to men who had so far been silent to send him a postcard with an undertaking "To renounce war and never again directly or indirectly support or sanction another". Within a year there were 80,000 replies. After a brief period as "Dr. H.R.L. Sheppard's Movement" the name "Peace Pledge Union" was adopted on 22 May 1936. In July of that year women were for the first time invited to sign the pledge and membership increased to 100,000.

Many leading public figures gave their support. Important early signatories included Frank Crozier, Edmund Blunden, and Siegfried Sassoon, whose Memoirs of an Infantry Officer have done much to engender disgust at the bloodshed of war.

Supported by a membership which had reached 136,000 by early 1940, the PPU played an important role in the debates on appeasement, air-raid precautions and conscription. The movement also helped in the relief of Jewish refugees. Dick Sheppard's 1937 victory over Winston Churchill and Lord Haldane in the election for Rector of Glasgow University reflected the immense popularity of the movement in the years leading up to the Second World War.

The period 1939-1945 was one of the most significant and active phases in the history of this pressure group. Not only did the PPU campaign against the war itself, pressing vigorously for a negotiated peace, but it also launched a number of special campaigns. These included the Campaign to Stop Night Bombing, the Food Relief Campaign and the Women's Peace Campaign. Leading members of the PPU were prosecuted over an anti-war poster, the Home Secretary kept a "close watch" on PPU activities and the Director of Public Prosecutions banned a book being sold by the PPU.

No-one can doubt the intellectual calibre of the PPU. Notable pacifists of all inspiration joined including Vera Brittain, Laurence Housman, Aldous Huxley, Ethel Mannin, Sybil Thorndike, Michael Tippett and Alex Wood; the Christian Socialists James Barr, James Hudson, George Lansbury and Alfred Salter; Socialist Pacifists such as Max Plowman, Arthur Ponsonby and Wilfred Wellock; and from the clergy, the Reverend George MacLeod, founder of the Iona Community and the Methodist, Reverend Donald Soper. The meetings and publications of the PPU provided all members with an opportunity to exert their influence and authority on wider public opinion.

After the horrors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the PPU continued its campaign against conscription and this reached a height during the Korean War and Suez crisis. The Food Relief Campaign developed into the Save Europe Now programme which helped to provide fuel, clothing and shelter to the dispossessed of Europe.

A serious study of the meaning of non-violent resistance and its application as an alternative to war in the process of resolving conflict and oppression led to the creation of a group called Operation Gandhi. They held the first civil disobedience demonstration against the atomic bomb outside the War Office on 11 January 1952. The first demonstration at Aldermaston followed soon after on 19 April 1952. The Direct Action Committee developed from this group and they were active against a number of bases and organised the first Aldermaston March in 1958.

The manuscript Minute Books, Annual Reports and publication of the PPU illustrate in detail this movement's beliefs, actions and achievements over a period of half a century. They cover the PPU's early years and stretch through the Second World War to the PPU's role in recent debates - from the East-West confrontation, war in Vietnam, conflict in Northern Ireland, NATO, the 1968 invasion of Czechoslovakia, the Falklands, to continued concern over nuclear weapons.

The guide provides a full listing of reel contents.

The first reel of each part gives a complete list of contents included in that part, and each reel includes a list of titles which appear on it. This guide also provides some notes for scholars on the organisational structure of the PPU and its publications as well as an explanation of the inclusion and omission of some items. In this respect we have closely followed the wishes of the PPU's Archivist, Bill Hetherington, and we are most grateful to him for his advice and assistance.

OUTLINE CHRONOLOGY, 1934 - 1986

- 16 October 1934. Letter of appeal from Dick Sheppard published in numerous newspapers.
- 14 July 1935. Albert Hall meeting followed by launch of Dr. H.R.L. Sheppard's Movement.
- 22 May 1936. Movement formally adopted the name Peace Pledge Union.
- 2 July 1936. Women formally invited to sign the pledge.
- 25 July 1936. Peace News formally adopted as weekly newspaper of The P.P.U.
- February 1937. No More War Movement merged with P.P.U. which now affiliated to The War Resisters International.
- 24 October 1937. Dick Sheppard elected Rector of Glasgow University defeating Winston Churchill and J.B.S. Haldane.
- 31 October 1937. Death of Dick Sheppard.
- 15 April 1939. P.P.U. headquarters at Dick Sheppard House formally opened.
- 17 February 1940. Women's Peace Day - demonstrations held throughout Britain as part of The Women's Peace Campaign.
- May to June 1940. Prosecution of six P.P.U. members including Alex Wood and Stuart Morris over a poster breaching Defence Regulations.
- 24 January 1942. Public Meeting to launch Food Relief Campaign.
- August to September 1945. P.P.U. begins People's Peace Crusade.

- 5 November 1949. Steps-to-Peace-Commissions set up. The most important were the Nonviolence Commission and the Education Commission.
- 6 August 1950. First mass demonstration against nuclear weapons organised by P.P.U. in Trafalgar Square.
- 11 January 1952. Demonstration outside the War Office (Operation Gandhi).
- 19 April 1952. First Demonstration at Aldermaston (Operation Gandhi).
- 4 September 1954. Major Demonstration in Trafalgar Square to renounce the H. Bomb.
- October to December 1956. Suez Crisis - major emphasis on campaign against conscription; help also extended to army reservists.
- April to May 1961. P.P.U. and Peace News severed formal connection but an informal connection has continued to be maintained through overlap of membership between P.P.U. and PN's editorial and managing bodies.
- 14 November 1964. Mobile pageant through London to mark 50th anniversary of start of the First World War.
- February 1965. Vietnam - Renewed campaign against escalation of American involvement in Vietnam conflict.
- 25 March 1972. March of Shame over Northern Ireland.
- July 1975. Schools Project run by the P.P.U. - Peace Education Project developed from this, combining the previous discussions between teachers with providing study material for children.
- August 1977. Roots of Peace Exhibition in the courtyard of St. Martins-in-the-Fields. This led to a greater emphasis on providing exhibition material.

- The shift within P.P.U. towards providing information resources as well as overt campaigning material also dates from this period.
- January 1980. Campaign Against Militarism launched.
- 2 April to 14 June 1982. Falklands Conflict - P.P.U. opposed the war but supported self-determination for the Islanders.
- November 1983. Mass distribution of white poppies, a feature of The 1930s, revived, together with alternative Remembrance ceremonies.
- 16 October 1984. 50th Anniversary Appeal for members, signed by Sir Michael Tippett and Sponsors, appeared in the Guardian and elsewhere.
- Autumn 1986. White Poppies mentioned in Parliament and throughout media.

ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The following notes on the organisational structure of the PPU are provided to facilitate scholarly use of the Minutes and Annual Reports. They give an overview of the basic organisation of the PPU as it has developed over the years.

When Dick Sheppard sent out his letter in October 1934 he had no idea of forming an organisation, but after the Albert Hall Rally in July 1935 a movement began to emerge. This was initially called "Dr. H.R.L. Sheppard's Movement". Although there is evidence that he had some kind of steering committee it was not until 22 May 1936 that the Peace Pledge Union was formally constituted and the Minutes run continuously from that date.

The initial governing body was the "Sponsors" nominated by Sheppard. After his death on 31 October 1937 the first AGM was held in April 1938. At this meeting the idea of a formal constitution was abandoned but it was decided instead that the membership should elect the sponsors. They in turn appointed an Executive Committee.

In 1939 the elected body was renamed the National Council and sponsorship became a purely honorific office. The size and method of election of the National Council have varied considerably over the years. In 1980 the prefix "National" was dropped.

Since 1940 there have been a variety of Committees of Council in addition to the Executive Committee, to undertake specialist tasks. Two major ones have been the Campaign Committee (outreach) and the Development Committee (membership and groups), which are now merged. Other committees have dealt with Finance, Fund-raising and Literature. During the Second World War there were specialist committees for the different campaigns, Food Relief, Negotiated Peace etc. The Forethought Committee was perhaps the most influential. In addition, working parties are set up from time to time. All these committees are responsible to Council and normally have membership from both within and without Council. The Officers of Council are Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson and Treasurer(s). The post of General Secretary which began in 1936 was abolished in 1974, the staff becoming co-equal. There is an honorary post of President.

From 1936 groups started up all over the country, numbering at one time some one thousand. They were divided into areas with an Area Council, which sent a delegate to the National Council. Some large areas were sub-divided into regions. This structure of local groups has now largely fallen into abeyance, but three areas still maintain a nominal existence in 1987. Some minuted records and other documents for local groups are included in Part 1 - London Area, Streatham, Richmond, Edmonton and Nottingham. More recently, groups and individuals have referred directly to the Council.

There are also a number of sub-groups organically related to the PPU. The Pacifist Youth Action Group (PYAG) existed for about a decade from 1953. The Youth Association of the PPU (YAPPU), 1968-1974, metamorphasised into the Youth Action Committee (YAC). Young Peacemakers (YPM) was started in 1984.

In 1949 a number of Steps-to-Peace Commissions were set up, of which the most significant were the Nonviolence Commission and the Education Commission. The latter has evolved through the Education Committee and the Education for Peace Group which runs the Peace Education Project (PEP).



In each class of material the items within each category have been placed chronologically, except where an item has gone through more than one edition when they follow immediately after each other for ease of comparison.

A precise or approximate year of publication has, where necessary, been noted in the top right hand corner of each leaflet, broadsheet and poster (or on page 2 where the design of page 1 makes it impossible), and similarly on the first inside page of each pamphlet and pack.

For some types of material there may be no items for a given category, but the sequence of categories is always followed.



NOTES ON INCLUSION AND OMISSION OF ITEMS

It appears that from 1938-1946 inclusive, except for the 4th and 5th AGMs of 1941 and 1942, it was the custom not to have official minutes of AGMs, but rather to rely upon detailed reports in Peace News. Therefore for the AGM minutes which one would expect to find in Volumes 4 to 9 inclusive of the Minute Books one must refer as follows:

Thus, only those Peace News pamphlets which either bear the imprint "published for the PPU" or were effectively commissioned by a committee of the PPU as part of its work are included in this microform edition of the PPU archive.

As a Special Supplement to Series Three of our programme devoted to Pacifism, Disarmament and International Relations, Harvester Microform are proud to announce the publication of The Archive of the Campaign Against the Arms Trade. This makes available on one reel a complete run of the CAAT Newsletter from November 1974 to February 1986 and also included are a number of Key Letters, Fact Sheets, CAAT Leaflets, pamphlets, booklets and posters.

The Campaign Against the Arms Trade was founded in 1974. As a network of groups and individuals, involved in education, research, and action against the arms trade, the organisation has vigorously campaigned since 1974 for the conversion of military industry to a peaceful role.

This action has taken a variety of forms and this is reflected in the material covered by this publication. The main focus is on British arms exports but CAAT cooperates with groups in other countries as well.

CAAT have produced a significant amount of information on their major campaign efforts and these include the campaign for the "conversion of military industries to peaceful, socially useful production", "Closing the Defence Sales Organisation", putting pressure on military exporting companies, human rights issues, "World Development and an end to the disastrous effects of arms imports", church pressure for a halt to arms exports, trade union activity for conversion, and protests against arms exhibitions.

Attention is drawn to the fact that CAAT is a completely separate organisation from the Peace Pledge Union. However, the PPU are one of the founder sponsors of CAAT. Other sponsors include the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, the Fellowship of Reconciliation [microform editions of the archives of these two organisations are also available from Harvester Microform], the National Peace Council, and the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, and a number of other groups.

A few items relating to COPAT, the Committee on Poverty and the Arms Trade, have been included. COPAT includes representatives of CAAT and other organisations.

The University of London Photographic Department has exercised the most responsible care in the filming of this material and this microfilm publication meets the standards

established by the Association for Information and Image Management (AIIM) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI).

The Special Supplement appears as Reel 27 after the final reel of Part 2 of the Archives of the Peace Pledge Union.
