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## WOMEN'S INTERNATIONAL LEAGUE FOR PEACE AND FREEDOM

United States Section, 1919-1959

The Swarthmore College Peace Collection is the official repository for the records of the United States Section of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF). Records of the U.S. Section were first sent to the Friends Historical Library of Swarthmore College in the summer of 1929 when the WILPF National Office moved from one office to another in Washington, DC. This accession included some material that Jane Addams had sent to the national office. In 1930, Addams donated a collection of books and personal papers relating to peace and social justice to Friends Historical Library. Much of this material concerned her work with the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, which she served as international president from its founding in 1919 until 1929 when she became honorary international president, remaining in this post until her death in 1935.

These two accessions became the foundation for the establishment in 1935 of the Swarthmore College Peace Collection. The first curator was Ellen Starr Brinton, a WILPF staff member, who made a special effort to collect and preserve the historic records of WILPF on an international, national, and local level. By 1947 she had collected 40 feet of material relating to the WILPF International Office and 150 feet of records of the United States Section.

The Swarthmore College Peace Collection also has a significant collection of records of the Woman's Peace Party, 1915-1919, available on microfilm from Scholarly Resources Inc.

### Scope and Content

The Scholarly Resources microfilm edition of the records of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom--United States Section documents the history of the organization from late 1919 through 1959. Records from 1960 to the present and material filed in series other than those selected for microfilming are available for use by researchers in the Swarthmore College Peace Collection.

The three series selected for inclusion in this microfilm edition are Series A, Historical Records (Subseries A,1 through A,5); Series C, Correspondence; and Series E, Serial Publications.

Series A,1 -- General Historical Records, 1919-ca. 1977 (2 1/2 ft.) includes constitutions; statements of program, principles, and policies; information on the history and organization of WILPF, including two organizational studies by outside consultants; handbooks listing officers, board members, committee chairmen, and leaders of state and local branches; programs and other material relating to Annual Meetings; and papers of incorporation, minutes, and some correspondence relating to WILPF Incorporated (a body incorporated in New York to receive gifts and bequests). Because of the arrangement of this series, it was not possible to cut off the microfilm

at 1959. Most of the material predates 1959, but there are scattered items from the 1960s and 1970s.

Series A,2 (6 3/4 ft.) is entitled Minutes, Resolutions, and Reports. Included are materials relating to the National Board, the Executive Committee, and Annual Meetings of WILPF from 1920 to 1959. Again, it was not possible to cut off microfilming neatly at 1959 because of the arrangement of certain boxes. Minutes of the National Board through 1961, resolutions of Annual Meetings through 1969, and resolutions of the National Board through 1970 are included in the microfilm.

Series A,1 and A,2 were originally microfilmed in 1980 under a grant from the Jane Addams Peace Association. The remainder of the collection in this microfilm edition was filmed in 1987 by Scholarly Resources Inc.

Series A,3 (2 1/4 ft.) contains material relating to Anniversaries and Celebrations, 1935-1957. Programs, minutes and correspondence of anniversary committees, publicity, and special publications for the twentieth (1935) through fortieth (1955) anniversaries are included, plus a small amount of material about the special recognition of Emily Greene Balch on her ninetieth birthday in January 1957.

Series A,4 --Committees and Conferences (4 1/2 ft.) includes material relating to the many committees established by the U.S. Section for administrative, study, or action purposes from 1920 to 1959. These records contain both committee files maintained in the WILPF National Office and, in some cases, records created and kept by the various committee chairmen. The files of the following committees are more extensive than the rest: Committee on Conscientious Objection, 1939-1948; Disarmament Committee, 1929-1935; and Refugee Committee, [1938-1943]-1948. Also in this series are reports and other material concerning the work of several field secretaries and a small amount of material about WILPF Regional Conferences.

Series A,5 (3 ft.) consists of Literature and Releases of the U.S. Section, 1919-1959. Included are printed items such as pamphlets, leaflets, and reprints from non-WILPF publications; and mimeographed material, including form letters sent to WILPF members, press releases and public statements, speeches, study outlines, and literature lists of material published by or distributed by the WILPF Literature Office.

Series C contains Correspondence files of the WILPF National Office from 1919-1955 and of the national organization secretary from 1934-1946. The correspondence held by the Peace Collection for the years 1956-1959 appears to be incomplete. Rather than film this limited amount of correspondence, it was decided to stop Series C at 1955 in the hope that additional correspondence from 1956-1959 will be found at some future time.

The correspondence in Series C is primarily that of the national secretary (also called national administrative secretary or executive secretary). However, the correspondence of other staff members and of the president of the U.S. Section and other officers also is included. Correspondence of the national organization secretary, Mildred Scott Olmsted, from 1934 to 1946, is also filed in Series C but is in separate boxes. Additional correspondence of Olmsted can be found with the records of the

Pennsylvania Branch in Series B,3 (not microfilmed). Correspondence will also be found in Series A,4 -- Committees and Conferences, and in Series B, Branches (not microfilmed). Correspondence of the Legislative Office is filed in Series A,6 (not microfilmed).

Two of these titles extend past the cutoff date of 1959 for this microfilm edition. However, since both have ceased publication, it was decided to include them rather than to film only part of each title.

Washington Newsletter was issued by the Legislative Office and sent with the Branch Packet for many years. Although the records of the Legislative Office are not included in this microfilm edition, it was decided to include the Washington Newsletter in order to show the legislative issues that the U.S. Section followed and acted upon. Records of the Legislative Office are available to researchers in the Swarthmore College Peace Collection.

Similarly, the records of the Committee for World Development and World Disarmament are not included in this microfilm edition but are available for use by researchers in the Peace Collection. Toward a World Disarmed and Monthly Bulletin are included to illustrate the important work of this committee.

Four Lights, published by the U.S. Section from June 1941 to January 1970, is available on microfilm from University Microfilms International or may be borrowed through interlibrary loan from the Peace Collection.

### History

The United States Section of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom originated in January 1915 as the Woman's Peace Party. At a conference in Washington, DC, called by Jane Addams and Carrie Chapman Catt, approximately 3000 women approved a platform calling for a conference of neutrals to offer continuous mediation as a way to end war, the extension of suffrage to women, and the establishment of the Woman's Peace Party (WPP). Additional provisions called for the limitation of armaments and the nationalization of their manufacture, organized opposition to militarism, education of youth in the ideals of peace, democratic control of foreign policy, and removal of the economic causes of war. Addams was elected chairman of the WPP.

In April 1915 representatives of the Woman's Peace Party participated in the International Congress of Women held at The Hague. This congress adopted a program similar to the platform of the WPP and established the International Committee of Women for Permanent Peace (ICWPP), made up of not more than five women from each of the twelve nations represented at the congress. Addams, who had chaired the Hague Congress, was selected as international chairman. At the first Annual Meeting, held in January 1916, the Woman's Peace Party voted to become the U.S. Section of the ICWPP.

The 1915 Congress at The Hague had voted to hold a second international congress of women at the end of the war at the same time as the negotiations to frame the terms of peace. In May 1919 the second International Congress of Women was held in Zurich, Switzerland, while the Paris Peace Conference was in session. When the terms of the Treaty of Versailles were made public, the women at the Zurich congress passed a number of resolutions pointing out the dangers to permanent peace contained in the provisions of the treaty. The delegates to the Zurich congress, representing nineteen countries, were unable to reach agreement on supporting the League of Nations, so no position was officially taken. All agreed in desiring a world league representing the will of the people, with membership open to all states; immediate reduction of armament on the same terms for all; universal free trade; and "sanctions" in no case to involve military force or food blockades.

The delegates voted to form a permanent organization, changing its name to the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. Headquarters were moved from Amsterdam to Geneva to be near the proposed site of the League of Nations. Jane Addams was made international president, and Emily Greene Balch of Massachusetts was elected international secretary-treasurer in charge of the Geneva office.

In November 1919 the Woman's Peace Party voted to change its name to the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, Section for the United States. Mrs. Anna Garlin Spencer was selected as national chairman. (See Appendix I for list of those who have served the U.S. Section as chairman or president from 1919 to 1961). The headquarters of the Woman's Peace Party had been in Chicago, home of Jane Addams. The U.S. Section of WILPF established its national office in New York City in early 1920 but moved to Washington, DC, in November 1921.

The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom is an international organization with headquarters in Geneva. There are members all over the world and established national sections in many countries. These national sections are autonomous in terms of organization, finance, and action, and are free to interpret the broad principles and policies adopted by the international congresses held approximately every three years.

The U.S. Section is governed by a National Board of Directors consisting of the national officers, state presidents, chairmen of certain committees, and a number of elected and appointed members. The National Board has the authority to administer the affairs of the U.S. Section, subject to instructions from the Annual Meeting. The size and composition of the National Board are stated in the WILPF constitution and have been changed periodically. Since 1972, a majority of the board members have been elected on a regional basis.

The National Board elects the officers of the U.S. Section and appoints the chairmen of standing committees. Much of the work of the U.S. Section is done by administrative and program committees. Committee chairmen work closely with paid staff members to plan WILPF activities and to disseminate information to local branches and the general public. The number, names, and organizational structure of WILPF committees have changed through the years. In December 1954 there were 33 divisions, committees, and subcommittees.

The Annual Meeting of the U.S. Section, attended by delegates from branches throughout the country, discusses and approves a policy statement and program for the coming year. Reports are given by national officers, staff members, and committee chairmen. Resolutions are passed stating WILPF positions and asking for specific actions by government officials and others. The budget also is adopted at the Annual Meeting. At the Annual Meeting in 1970, it was decided to hold national membership meetings biennially (starting in 1971), with regional meetings in the years when a Biennial Meeting was not scheduled.

The United States Section of WILPF is made up of many local branches. As the membership grew quickly, from about 500 to over 1300 in 1921, state chairmen became necessary to coordinate the work of local groups formed in various areas. By May 1924 the U.S. Section had 26 branches and the membership had increased to about 6000.

Local branches carry out the active legislative and educational work of the organization. They hold public meetings, conduct study groups and service projects, and participate in various campaigns and activities coordinated by the state and national offices. Local branches often undertake joint activities with other organizations.

The importance of the state branch within the organizational structure of the U.S. Section has varied from state to state and from one time period to another. Among the states which had strong state branches prior to 1959 are the following: California, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania. Most of these states maintained offices with paid staff members, sent out regular newsletters, and acted as service centers for local branches within the state.

WILPF officers, board members, and committee chairmen are assisted in their work by a small paid staff. (See Appendix II for list of key staff members of the U.S. Section.) Prior to the appointment of Amy Woods in October 1922, there was considerable turnover in the position of executive secretary. Woods was followed by Dorothy Detzer, who served as executive secretary from 1924 to 1946. Detzer focused much of her attention on legislative activities and was well known as a lobbyist on Capitol Hill. Her Branch Letters are full of detailed reports on legislative issues of interest to WILPF.

Mildred Scott Olmsted served as executive secretary of the Pennsylvania Branch from 1922 to 1946. Beginning in 1934, she also served as national organization secretary of the U.S. Section, with primary responsibility for maintaining close contact with branches and for developing branch work and organization. Her Organization Letter was an important channel of communication between the national officers and committee chairmen and the state and local branch presidents and other members of the National Board. Olmsted became national administrative secretary in 1946. She retired as executive director in 1966 after forty-four years of dedicated service to the Pennsylvania Branch and the U.S. Section of WILPF.

By 1940 the U.S. Section had 13,000 members and over 100 branches. Membership dropped significantly during World War II, however. In January 1955 there were 4336 members in ten state branches and 62 local branches. The Jane Addams Branch was formed in 1948 for members at large who belonged to the U.S. Section but lived in areas where there was no local branch.

The national headquarters of the U.S. Section was located initially in New York City but moved to Washington, DC, in late 1921. In 1946, when Olmsted became administrative secretary, the WILPF National Office moved from Washington to Philadelphia where it is still located. At the same time, a separate Legislative Office was established in Washington under the direction of a legislative secretary. The strength of WILPF in the Philadelphia area and the availability of dedicated volunteers have been factors in the decision to keep the national office in Philadelphia rather than moving to either Washington or New York. The New York office of WILPF was established in 1950 when Gladys D. Walser became U.S. Section observer to the United Nations. For several years, her apartment served as the WILPF office in New York. In 1953, space was rented in the Carnegie Building at United Nations Plaza to be used by the WILPF observer to the United Nations and by the Committee for World Development and World Disarmament. The Jane Addams Peace Association also used this office from 1955 to 1979. (See Appendix III for list of addresses of the WILPF National Office and other offices.)

WILPF was the first international organization of women devoted to efforts to establish permanent peace. Throughout its history, WILPF members

have sought to work by nonviolent means for the establishment of those political, economic, social, and psychological conditions throughout the world that can assure peace, freedom, and justice for all.

The object of the U.S. Section, as stated in its 1919 constitution, was "to promote methods for the attainment of that peace between nations which is based on justice and good will and to cooperate with women from other countries who are working for the same ends." Membership was open to all women who substantially supported the platform of the U.S. section and who paid the prescribed dues. Men became eligible for associate membership in 1921.

Statements of principles and policies reiterated through the years have stressed the interdependence of peace, freedom, and justice. A 1951 statement defined these concepts as follows:

Peace . . . is much more than the absence of war or maintenance of order through dominance of force. It is a positive principle of human relations and can be found only where there is free cooperation for the common good.

Freedom: "Liberty of the human spirit is a basic value. Although freedom must be exercised with responsibility, and individuals in society must accept much control in the common interests, nevertheless they must have the right to contribute to decisions and to express differing opinions through free democratic processes. Contrary to this freedom are all forms of dictatorship, all imperialisms, all suppressions of civil liberties, and discrimination based on race, class, sex, or opinions."

Justice is essential to Peace and Freedom. The present disintegration of our culture is a demonstration of the deep-seated injustices in our economic and political structures. The only answer to the threat of totalitarianism is the development of a democratic social order in which the dynamic forces of scientific discovery and economic change can be utilized to enrich the life of all members of the human family.

(Four Lights, XI, no. 3, July 1951)

Through educational and legislative campaigns, WILPF has supported total and universal disarmament, measures to remove the economic causes of war, pacific settlement of international disputes, and the establishment of legal machinery for such settlement. WILPF members have stressed the importance of education for peace and have campaigned against militaristic toys. The following paragraphs provide a brief summary of some of the specific issues that were of concern to the U.S. Section between 1919 and 1959, but they are not intended to provide a complete historical account of all that the U.S. Section attempted to do or actually accomplished during this period.

In January 1920 WILPF appealed to the State Department for the release of political prisoners and conscientious objectors, protested against the deportation of those designated as "reds," and opposed compulsory military training as a feature of plans for the reorganization of the U.S. Army. The U.S. Section also urged that the U.S. government recognize the Bolshevik government of Russia and take measures to alleviate the suffering and

starvation caused by the prolonged blockade of that country.

The Fourth International Congress of WILPF was held in Washington in 1924. Following the congress, many of the European delegates went on a speaking tour on the "Pax Special" train. They visited 23 cities, holding meetings and making speeches in an attempt to arouse sentiment for "a New International Order." Considerable opposition to their ideas was evident in some cities. Amy Woods, national secretary from 1922-1924, stated that "the opposition to all forms of peace work which has recently shown itself throughout the country is the symptom of our growing strength."

In the period 1925-1927 the U.S. Section focused attention on the problem of economic and financial imperialism. Members succeeded in having drafted and introduced into both houses of Congress a bill that was devised to prevent the United States from becoming involved on behalf of citizens' investments in foreign countries. In 1926 a goodwill mission was sent to investigate conditions in Haiti, under the sponsorship of WILPF and with the cooperation of the Fellowship of Reconciliation and the American Friends Service Committee. Its recommendations to President Coolidge, published under the title Occupied Haiti, eventually led to an official inquiry under President Hoover which resulted in the withdrawal of the Marines and new treaty arrangements. A nationwide campaign by WILPF and other groups in 1926-1927 against intervention in Mexico was followed by a reversal of State Department policy and the turning back of the U.S. Army near the border of Mexico. WILPF also was effective in influencing U.S. government policy in regard to Cuba, Nicaragua, and Liberia.

Since 1919 the U.S. Section had supported the idea of democratic world government but had held reservations about whether the United States should enter the League of Nations. After lengthy discussion, a resolution was finally passed at the Annual Meeting in 1927, stating that the WILPF "desires to see the United States enter the League of Nations, providing only that it does so with the understanding that the United States is exempt from any obligation to supply military forces or to join in exerting military pressure in any case."

In the late 1920s, WILPF sought to develop support for treaties that would outlaw war as a means of settling international disputes. At the request of WILPF, Professor Francis B. Sayre of the Harvard Law School drafted a model arbitration treaty that was widely circulated. Also in 1927, WILPF presented a petition bearing 30,000 signatures asking President Coolidge to initiate treaties to outlaw war. WILPF actions helped to lay the foundation for the acceptance of the Kellogg-Briand Pact for the Renunciation of War, signed in August 1928 by fifteen countries and ratified by the U.S. Senate in 1929.

During 1931, Jane Addams was selected for several significant awards. She received the Bryn Mawr Award for Distinguished Service and the Pictorial Review Prize as the most famous woman in America. In December 1931 it was announced that the Nobel Peace Prize was to be awarded jointly to Addams and Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University. Addams announced that her part of the award would be used to further the projects of the Geneva office of the WILPF.

When the World Disarmament Conference at Geneva was convened in 1932, peace advocates presented over 8 million signatures on petitions for disarmament. Of these, 6 million, for total and universal disarmament, had been collected by WILPF members in many countries. The U.S. Section organized a Peace Caravan from Los Angeles to Washington that travelled 10,000 miles across the country, holding meetings and gathering signatures.

For a number of years, WILPF had sought to find a way to curb private profit and traffic in the weapons of war. At the 1933 Annual Meeting, the U.S. Section adopted a resolution urging President Roosevelt to propose a senatorial investigation into the private manufacture of arms. Dorothy Detzer, executive secretary of the U.S. Section, is credited with influencing Senator Gerald P. Nye to introduce in January 1934 a resolution to investigate the manufacture of armaments. WILPF supported this investigation and helped to give nationwide publicity to the influence of arms manufacturers in precipitating international and civil war and in preventing world disarmament. The Nye Commission proposed a comprehensive program of interlocking legislative measures to maintain peace and to safeguard the rights of U.S. citizens. The Neutrality Bill, providing for an embargo on arms and loans to nations at war, was the only legislation even partially enacted into law, and it was not passed in the form proposed by the Nye Commission. The U.S. Section continued to seek amendments to strengthen the Neutrality Act.

In 1934 legislation also was passed to give independence to the Philippines, a goal for which WILPF had worked since 1921.

The U.S. Section had long advocated that the United States join the World Court, stating in 1922 that "the establishment of the World Court on a permanent and secure basis offers a medium for the transfer of international disputes from the battle field to the court of law." The issue came before Congress in 1935 but was defeated by a tiny margin in spite of lobbying efforts by many peace groups, including WILPF. The United States finally joined the World Court at the end of World War II.

WILPF celebrated its twentieth anniversary in 1935. A banquet was held in Washington on May 2, 1935, to honor Jane Addams. Eleanor Roosevelt was one of the main speakers. The following day, an around-the-world radio broadcast was arranged, the first of its kind, during which ambassadors and statesmen paid tribute to the League and to Addams as one of its founders. She died just three weeks later.

The Peoples Mandate to Governments to End War was one of the last projects approved by Addams before her death. This campaign grew out of the work of the WILPF, U.S. Section, Disarmament Campaign Committee, a petition drive begun in 1931 and managed by Mabel Vernon. The Peoples Mandate was launched as an international campaign on September 6, 1935, the seventy-fifth anniversary of Addams's birth. The purpose of the Peoples Mandate was "to express such overwhelming opposition to war that governments will not dare resort to it." The goal was to secure 50 million signatures from citizens in fifty countries and to present the mandate to the Council and Assembly of the League of Nations. The Peoples Mandate Committee for the Western Hemisphere and the Far East was established as a separate organization in January 1936. Later the name was changed to Peoples Mandate Committee for Inter-American

Peace and Cooperation. Mabel Vernon served as director of the mandate campaign in the United States.

Also in the mid-1930s, WILPF joined with some forty other national organizations to set up the National Peace Conference, as a way of unifying and coordinating the efforts of various groups interested in world justice and peace. In 1936-1937 the WILPF participated in the Emergency Peace Campaign, a nationwide effort to keep the United States out of war and to promote world peace.

During the late 1930s, WILPF members sought to give aid to refugees from Nazi persecution in Europe, some of whom were women they had met at WILPF international congresses. A Committee on Refugees was established in 1938 to promote WILPF efforts in this area, particularly in securing affidavits of support for refugees.

As the situation in Europe deteriorated, it became apparent that differences of opinion existed within the WILPF membership concerning WILPF policies. Early in 1939 the National Board agreed to conduct a "poll of opinion" among WILPF members. Material on two patterns of political and economic action that the United States might follow, described as the "collective security" position and the "proneutrality" position, was sent to the membership for discussion. Results indicated that 75 percent of the members favored the proneutrality position of the WILPF, based on a program calling for mandatory neutrality, the war referendum, a peace-time embargo on all munitions, and similar policies.

An emergency meeting of the National Board held on December 10, 1941, issued a statement that said, in part:

The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, which was born in the throes of the first world war, has devoted 26 years to the task of working for those political and economic arrangements on which alone a lasting peace would have been possible. The war in which we find ourselves today is the inevitable result of a world organized for war and not for peace. . . . Finally, we would point out that the entire breakdown of political efforts into active warfare convinces us anew that neither the United States nor the rest of the world can ever be truly free until the conditions of peace have been established for all nations and all peoples. Mankind must some day be released from the violence and suffering and waste of this recurring tragedy. For us, war remains the final infamy.

When the United States entered the war, the opportunities for WILPF action necessarily changed. During the war, the WILPF program stressed mediation, the establishment of a peace aims commission, the importance of democratic world government, and the protection of civil liberties. Members continued to do what they could to assist European refugees and to combat anti-Semitism. They befriended and helped to resettle Japanese-Americans evacuated from California. They opposed the conscription of women and of 18- and 19-year-old men and supported men who were conscientious objectors. WILPF also worked for federal antipoll tax legislation and for the abrogation of the Chinese Exclusion Act.

At the close of the war, WILPF observers followed closely the discussions from Dumbarton Oaks to San Francisco as the charter of the United Nations was developed. The participation of WILPF and other organizations in the San Francisco Conference established a precedent that later led to the formal recognition of nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) at the United Nations.

In the early postwar period, the U.S. Section urged a vast program of reconstruction aid to countries devastated by the war. Many WILPF members participated in relief activities, packing food and clothing to send abroad, although they stressed that efforts to create a world in which people could live together in peace were far more important in the long run than short-term efforts to relieve suffering.

In August 1946 the Tenth International Congress of WILPF was held in Luxembourg on the theme of "A New World Order." Thirteen sections were able to send representatives; ten were not. Exhausted and disillusioned by their experiences during the war, some had lost their enthusiasm for peace work and thought that the League should not continue as a separate women's organization. A motion for dissolution was introduced by the Dutch section but was overwhelmingly defeated. Resolutions were passed on many aspects of peace and international relations, and the League again pledged itself to try to organize a world in which the rights and dignity of all human beings were assured.

The Nobel Peace Prize was awarded to Emily Greene Balch, international president of WILPF, and to John Raleigh Mott in December 1946. Balch and Jane Addams are the only American women to have received this award.

By 1948 support for the United Nations had become a major part of WILPF's program. Members of the U.S. Section believed that the weakness and inadequacy of the United Nations was due to the climate of fear and distrust among member nations. They sought to create a climate in which states would cooperate to strengthen the international organization, gradually transforming the United Nations into a world government. WILPF International was granted consultative status with the UN Economic and Social Council in 1948, and in later years similar status was granted by UN agencies such as UNESCO, FAO, and UNICEF. Soon the U.S. Section appointed an accredited observer to the United Nations and established a separate office in New York for work with that body.

A Special Committee for World Reconstruction and World Disarmament was organized in 1950 to do research, offer publications, and conduct widespread community meetings, conferences, and workshops on these issues. In 1952 the name of the committee was changed to the Committee for World Development and World Disarmament (CWDWD). The New York office of WILPF served as the headquarters for this committee. The work of CWDWD was funded by the Jane Addams Peace Association (JAPA), incorporated in 1948 to pay for educational projects undertaken by the U.S. Section. Tax-exempt status was granted by the federal government in 1951. Other projects carried out under JAPA include Art for World Friendship, the Jane Addams Children's Book Award, and a variety of international conferences and scholarship programs.

Disarmament has been a major focus of WILPF activity through the years. In the 1950s the U.S. Section advocated a bold program for total universal disarmament under the supervision of the United Nations. They supported

measures leading toward this goal, such as cessation of nuclear weapons testing and the neutralization and eventual demilitarization of tension areas in Central Europe, the Middle East, the Far East, and Latin America. The U.S. Section supported international economic development to relieve human suffering and international problems caused by the low economic status of so much of the world. They preferred aid programs carried on through the United Nations and its specialized agencies, because they furnished safeguards against economic exploitation and lessened the fear of imperialist aims.

### Arrangement

The initial processing of WILPF records in the Peace Collection was done by Ellen Starr Brinton, who served as curator from 1935 to 1951. Brinton's correspondence with the WILPF office often reveals her frustration with the unsatisfactory condition of the files that were sent to Swarthmore for safekeeping. It seems clear that the present arrangement of the records is a result of her work and that of subsequent curators and student assistants, rather than an arrangement based on the way in which the files were kept in the WILPF National Office.

The records of the United States Section are divided into seven major series, three of which are included in this microfilm edition. Several of the major series are divided into subseries. A Summary Checklist appears at the beginning of the Checklist section to show the overall arrangement of the U.S. Section records held by the Peace Collection.

The initial decision about which series is the most appropriate place to file a folder of material or a single item is based on the nature of the material and its provenance. Some items clearly belong in a particular series because of the physical nature of the item. Scrapbooks, newspaper clippings, photographs, and audiovisual materials are filed in separate series because they have special conservation and storage needs. It is easier to handle such items separately from the more typical organizational records.

All items that originated in one of the state or local branches, such as minutes, correspondence, publications, and office files are filed in Series B, Branches (not microfilmed). Series A and C also contain information about the local branches in the form of reports submitted to the WILPF National Office and correspondence to and from leaders and members of local branches.

Similarly, records of WILPF committees are filed in Series A,4 -- Committees and Conferences. Included are minutes of committee meetings, reports, publications issued by the committee, and occasionally correspondence and working files of the committee chairmen. Series C contains correspondence of the WILPF National Office and the organization secretary with committee chairmen.

Because literature and releases are produced in multiple copies, they are often filed in more than one place. The Peace Collection may receive many copies of a particular publication from the WILPF office directly and from WILPF members and other organizations. In processing WILPF records for microfilming, the Peace Collection staff has tried to make Series A,5 -- Literature and Releases as complete as possible and to remove items available

in Series A,5 from other series. However, some leaflets and reports which relate to the work of WILPF committees also are filed in Series A,4.

Many items that were sent as enclosures with the Branch Letter or Branch Packet may be found in Series A,4 or A,5 as well as in Series E.

Series A contains a variety of material under the general title "Historical Records."

Series A,1 -- General Historical Records is arranged by type of material. In most folders, the material is filed in chronological order. Box 9 contains material added to the series after it had been microfilmed in 1980.

Series A,2 -- Minutes, Resolutions, and Reports is arranged chronologically. Most boxes cover a period of several years and contain separate folders for the National Board, the Executive Committee, and Annual Meetings during these years. However, certain boxes do not follow this pattern. Box 7 contains National Board Resolutions, 1939-1970, and Box 8 contains Annual Meeting Resolutions, 1939-1969. Both boxes contain a list of resolutions passed at each National Board meeting or Annual Meeting, listed by date. In addition, the text of all resolutions on a given subject is given, in alphabetical order by subject. Box 13 contains National Board minute books, 1949-1961, and Box 14 contains Executive Committee minute books, 1949-1957. Most of these books are in reverse chronological order, the order in which they were kept by the WILPF National Office. Researchers should look in the minute books in Boxes 13 and 14 and in the appropriate folders in the chronological boxes to be sure of finding all minutes. Box 17a contains material added to the series after it had been microfilmed in 1980.

Series A,3 -- Anniversaries and Celebrations is arranged chronologically with a separate sequence of folders for each anniversary. Part of the material about the fortieth anniversary is in alphabetical order.

Series A,4 -- Committees and Conferences is divided into two chronological periods. Boxes 1 through 6 contain material prior to 1950; boxes 7 through 10a contain material from 1950-1959. Records pertaining to Field Secretarial Work (primarily 1930-1941) are arranged in chronological order at the beginning of Box 1. Committee files in Boxes 1 and 2 are in alphabetical order by the name of the committee. There is one folder of material on Regional Conferences, 1931-1941, at the end of Box 2. Within each folder, material is filed in chronological order. In some instances (e.g., Finance Committee and the committees in Boxes 3-6), material pertaining to a particular committee has been subdivided by type of material, with each type in a separate folder. Boxes 3 through 6 contain records of the Committee on Conscientious Objection, the Disarmament Committee, and the Refugee Committee. These are filed in separate boxes because of the quantity of material.

Box 7 contains records pertaining to Field Service Work, 1955-1959, and to Regional Conferences, 1954-1959. Boxes 8 through 10a are arranged in alphabetical order by the name of the committee. Within each folder, material is filed in chronological order. Material in Box 10 pertaining to the United Nations Observer (or Consultant) is divided into two sequences, each in chronological order. Folders 7-10 contain a variety of general reports (primarily mimeographed) and related material about the work of the UN

Observer. Folders 11-15 contain detailed reports (usually typed) on events at the United Nations that were sent only to the WILPF legislative secretary and to members of the Policy Committee.

Series A,5 -- Literature and Releases is arranged by date, with each box covering a period of several years. Within each box, there are separate folders for different types of material. For example, the first folder in each box contains pamphlets and leaflets specifically about the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, its history, statements of purpose, membership appeals, and similar information. More general pamphlets and leaflets are filed in separate folders. Within each folder, material is filed by date.

The category "Form Letters (within WILPF)" contains mimeographed letters sent to local leaders, National Board members, or the general membership from the WILPF National Office, national officers, or committee chairmen. Some of these letters are very similar in content and appearance to the Branch Letters filed in Series E. Branch Letters are always addressed to state and local branches (or to branch leaders) and are written by the executive secretary or other WILPF staff member. Beginning in late 1934 Branch Letters are numbered. Both form letters and Branch Letters may contain enclosures.

The arrangement of Series C, Correspondence is basically chronological, with folders arranged in alphabetical order within each period of several years. Within each folder, the material is filed in chronological order. If a folder is arranged in some other way, a note in the front of the folder explains the arrangement.

In arranging the correspondence in Series C for microfilming, the Peace Collection staff generally has followed the archival principle of "respect pour l'ordre primitif" (sanctity of the original order) but has made some changes in order to simplify the overall arrangement of the series. One change, which may be apparent to researchers who used the collection prior to 1986, is that correspondence after 1934, formerly filed in one-year periods, has been consolidated in three- or four-year periods. Instead of having a separate alphabetical sequence of folders for each year, the folders have been interfiled within each three- or four-year period. By reducing the number of boxes in which a researcher would have to look, this change should make it easier to locate the correspondence to or from one individual.

Researchers should realize, however, that it may be necessary to look in several places in order to locate the correspondence to or from one individual. Readers should consider the point of view of the secretary who filed the correspondence in the first place. Usually there are several places in which a particular letter could properly be filed. It could be filed under the name of the individual from whom or to whom it was written or in a letter-of-the-alphabet folder for miscellaneous correspondence with individuals whose last names begin with the same letter. Alternatively, the letter might be filed geographically, under the name of the state or country in which the person lived. Another possibility would be under the name of an organization, a committee, or particular office within WILPF (e.g., legislative secretary). At different times, various secretaries have had different priorities and have made different choices among these possibilities. The Peace Collection staff has not attempted to impose a

consistent filing system but has worked with the arrangement as found. In some instances, letters were moved from a letter-of-the-alphabet folder or from a geographic folder to a folder designated by the name of the individual. This was done in order to bring together correspondence to or from one person.

Within each folder, correspondence is usually arranged in strict chronological order, even when this meant the separation of a letter from its reply. Occasionally, exceptions to this rule were made in order not to have a letter and its reply filed in different boxes. For example, a letter sent to the WILPF office in late December might not be answered until January. In this case, the earlier letter has been filed after the January reply. Also, enclosures are filed following the letters with which they were sent rather than placing them in their proper chronological position. Within letter-of-the-alphabet folders, the material is filed in alphabetical order by name of the individual or organization, then in chronological order.

"See" and "see also" references in the Checklist for Series C refer to other folder headings within the same chronological period in Series C.

Names beginning with "Mc" are filed as if spelled "Mac".

Series E, Serial Publications is arranged roughly in order of the beginning date of publication for each title. Branch Letter (1922-1956) and Branch Packet (1956-1959) are treated as one publication and are filmed in one chronological sequence because the Branch Letter continues as part of the Branch Packet. Titles which began publication in the 1920s precede Branch Letter/Branch Packet. Titles beginning in the 1930s or later are filed after Branch Letter/Branch Packet.

The official repository for the records of the international headquarters of WILPF in Geneva, Switzerland, is the Western Historical Collection, Norlin Library, University of Colorado at Boulder. These records are available on microfilm. The Peace Collection has collected a significant amount of material about WILPF International, including executive committee minutes (1920-1965), resolutions, scattered correspondence (1920-1953), reports, and materials on conferences and committees. Also included are minutes, resolutions, scattered correspondence, reports, and other material relating to the international congresses held by WILPF approximately every three years. There are miscellaneous materials (1915-date), primarily pamphlets, leaflets, and releases, from twenty-nine national sections of WILPF. Records for some national sections are more complete than others. In addition, the collection includes the correspondence files (1936-1952) of Heloise Brainerd who served as chairman of the Committee on the Americas for both WILPF International and the U.S. Section.
