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COLLECTION OVERVIEW

The collection of the Immigration and Refugee Services of America and its predecessor organizations contain rich textual documentation of the work of the agency and the people it served. The collection contains extensive correspondence with related service agencies, state and federal government officials, International Institute offices nationwide, writers, leading public spokespersons, and many more. Also included are voluminous files on social, cultural, and political issues associated with immigration, race, and ethnicity as well as resource materials on the full panorama of America's ethnic groups. The collection is arranged chronologically according to organization and then further divided by the internal divisions. Many of the internal divisions within the organization span most of its existence and changed relatively little except for in name. The challenge of arranging the material to best reflect the organization was difficult. The bulk of the material arrived in thirteen separate shipments. Each shipment contained material from all four organizations and in no discernable order. The material is arranged to closely resemble the infrastructure of each organization. The way each organization kept its files is revealing in comprehending the history of the organization itself.

INTRODUCTION

The Immigration and Refugee Services of America (IRSA) is a national, nonsectarian, nonprofit organization dedicated to assisting immigrants and refugees who have left their homes due to forced or voluntary migration.

IRSA traces its beginnings to 1918, when it was organized as the Foreign Language Information Service Division (FLIS) of the United States Committee on Public Information. The federal government realized that a large part of its foreign-tongued population was unaware of their responsibilities in aiding the allied cause.

Three of the major divisions of the FLIS (Foreign Language Press, Individual and Organization Service, and Foreign Language Organizations) were created to provide a unique service to a particular area of the immigrant community, while the fourth division (Immigrant Interpretation) focused on the native born population. FLIS was involved in adjusting problems that immigrants experienced with the federal income tax laws, applying for naturalization, insurance and compensation, education, and numerous other matters falling under the jurisdiction of the federal government, and provided individual assistance and adult education.

In 1934 with the continual decline of immigration due to restrictive legislation and depressed economic conditions, it became clear the FLIS had outlived its usefulness. In 1939 the Foreign Language Information Service was dissolved and a new organization was born.

The Common Council for American Unity (CCAU) resolved to overcome intolerance and discrimination in the United States because of foreign birth or descent, race or nationality. CCAU began to concentrate on the new issue, the issue of the "second generation" problem, a concept that refers to the offspring of immigrants who were perceived to be in an awkward transitional phase between the alien culture of their parents and the mainstream American culture. The Council launched a new quarterly periodical called *Common Ground*, which dealt with intercultural and interracial problems. CCAU launched a discussion group program and the Letters from America campaign to convey the truth about America abroad and correct misconceptions fostered by communist inspired propaganda, and created Nationality Organizations and Foreign Language Radio divisions.

The Council continued its work with the government on activities such as alien registration and foreign language publicity and provided translation services for a variety of governmental agencies, and supplied various federal and state governmental departments with information regarding America's nationality groups. The CCAU reinstated a Washington representative, who kept track of the daily developments in immigration and naturalization. The Council also played an active role in lobbying on immigration legislation.

Due to Council's continual financial difficulties, in 1959 it was merged with the American Federation of International Institutes (AFII). The purpose of the AFII was to provide the foreign born with the necessary resources to ease their adjustment to their new home and aid their cultural integration. AFII's goal was to encourage the development of self-reliant, loyal, and articulate citizens, who would participate intelligently and critically in the civic and social life of their communities. The AFII also sought to promote a better understanding and mutual appreciation among all members of American society in order to strengthen and enrich its culture and its institutions. The programs of the CCAU and AFII paralleled and complimented each other.

The new organization was named the American Council for Nationalities Service (ACNS). ACNS continued its cooperation with governmental and intergovernmental agencies passing along any pertinent information to its member agencies. It also continued to educate the immigrant through the foreign language press and radio, produce various publications, handle a limited amount of legal cases for individuals, and implement a variety of special projects. The national office also cultivated relationships with other national agencies including the National Social Welfare Assembly, the National Conference of Social Welfare, the American Immigration and Citizenship Conference, Church World Services, Catholic Relief Services, United HIAS Service and International Social Service are but a few.

The Service actively participated in the sponsorship and resettlement of foreign-born sons and daughters of United States citizen fathers, Cuban refugees upon their arrival with the Southeast Asian boatlift, Polish nationals, refugees from Indochina, and many other groups arriving to the United States. Through these programs, the ACNS became affiliated with the United State Committee for Refugees (USCR). The ACNS consolidated its programs and offices with the USCR in 1983 and adopted the name Immigration and Refugee Services of America.

EDITORIAL NOTE

Documents of the *Immigration and Refugee Services of America 1918-1985* from the holdings of the Immigration History Research Center at University of Minnesota will be published in several parts. A temporary collection guide shall be published for each part, with a cumulative guide appearing at the end of the microfilm project. Temporary collection guides include a shortened introduction. The cumulative collection guide shall contain a broader, more detailed description of the collection.

FORMAT

This guide lists materials in the order in which they appear on the reels. Materials are arranged on reels according to box and then folder number.

SELECTION PROCESS

The selection of materials for the microform edition of *Immigration and Refugee Services of America, 1918-1985* was based on several criteria:

Relevancy

Selected materials represent the history and development of Immigration and Refugee Services of America and its predecessor organizations. Selections emphasize their role in shaping America's immigration policy and legacy from the end of the 1910s into the 1980s. The documents reflect history of immigration in the United States and its influence on the larger American society. Materials that did not have as their primary focus this aspect were generally, although not always, excluded from publication.

Language

Present microfilm publication does not contain English translations of IRSA's "press releases" and "press reports," which already exist in microform. The "press releases" and "press reports" contained in this publication appear in their original languages.

Condition

Several files were not microfilmed owing to their fragile physical condition and were removed from consideration in order to reduce the risk of damage from microfilming.

Confidentiality

Some files could not be microfilmed for reasons of confidentiality and privilege. Individual and group legal cases represent the majority of such files.

ARRANGEMENT

The collection is arranged chronologically according to each IRSA organization: the Foreign Language Information Service (FLIS), the Common Council for American Unity (CCAU), the American Federation of International Institutes (AFII), and the American Council for Nationalities Services (ACNS). These are then further divided by the internal organization of each of these entities. The material is arranged to closely resemble the infrastructure of each organization and division. The way each organization kept its files is revealing in comprehending the history of the various organizations that sought to serve immigrant needs during twentieth century.

REEL INDEX

The contents of *Immigration and Refugee Services of America 1918-1985* were filmed in box and folder order. For this reason, the index to which folders lies on which reels appears hereunder, simplifying the search process for the researcher. All unmicrofilmed materials shall be collected as a single appendix to the final, cumulative guide to *Immigration and Refugee Services of America 1918-1985*.
